



# Hokies, Panthers Meet In Key BIG EAST Tilt

## THE SERIES

☛ Saturday's game will be the 10th football meeting between Virginia Tech and the University of Pittsburgh. Tech holds a 7-2 lead in the series. The two schools met for the first time in football at Pitt Stadium during the 1993 season with the Hokies taking a 63-21 win.

Tech defeated the Panthers by a score of 45-7 at Blacksburg in 1994 and followed with a 26-16 come-from-behind victory at Pittsburgh during the 1995 season. The Hokies won the 1996 meeting 34-17 at Lane Stadium.

The Panthers' first win in the series was a 30-23 decision at Pitt Stadium in 1997.

Tech won, 27-7, in Blacksburg during the 1998 season, took a 30-17 victory at Pittsburgh in 1999, then edged the Panthers, 37-34, at home in 2000. Pittsburgh won last year's game 38-7 at Heinz Field.

## THE GAME ON TV

☛ The Virginia Tech-Pittsburgh game will be televised by ESPN2. Dave Barnett will handle the play-by-play with Bill Curry and Mike Golic serving as the color analysts and Alex Flanagan providing sideline commentary.

Tech is 10-1 in games shown by ESPN2 and 19-3 in games televised by ESPN. Tech's only loss on ESPN2 was a 28-26 decision at Syracuse in 1998.

## COUNTDOWN TO KICKOFF

- 10 Virginia Tech has won 10 of its 11 appearances on ESPN2.
- 9 Tech has blocked nine kicks during its football series with the University of Pittsburgh.
- 8 Senior tailback Lee Suggs needs just 58 yards to move into eighth place in career rushing at Virginia Tech.
- 7 Tech has won seven or more games for the ninth straight season.
- 6 Since joining the BIG EAST Conference for football in 1991, the Hokies have lost just six league games at home.
- 5 Both Cols Colas and Jim Davis have already established new personal-bests for sacks in a season with 5.5 sacks each.
- 4 Redshirt sophomore receiver Richard Johnson had a career-best four pass receptions in the Temple game.

## THIS SEASON

☛ Virginia Tech is 8-0 overall and 3-0 in the BIG EAST following a 20-10 home win against Temple. Tech opened with home wins against Arkansas State (63-7), No. 14 LSU (26-8) and No. 16 Marshall (47-21). The Hokies posted consecutive road wins at No. 19 Texas A&M (13-3), at WMU (30-0) and at Boston College (28-23) before returning home to beat Rutgers (35-14).

☛ Pittsburgh is 6-2 overall and 3-0 in the BIG EAST. The Panthers are coming off a 19-16 overtime win over Boston College. Pittsburgh's other wins have come against Ohio (27-14), UAB (26-20), Rutgers (23-3), Toledo (37-19) and Syracuse (48-24). The Panthers' losses are to Texas A&M (14-12) and Notre Dame (14-6). They are 2-1 on the road.

**COACH FRANK BEAMER**

☛ Frank Beamer (Va. Tech '69), whose teams have averaged nine victories a year over the last nine seasons, is in his 16th year as the head football coach at Virginia Tech. Beamer has guided the Hokies to a 115-65-2 record. He became Tech's winningest football coach in 1997 when the Hokies defeated Arkansas State, 50-0.

Under Beamer, Tech football has enjoyed unprecedented success with nine consecutive bowl appearances, three BIG EAST Conference titles and a trip to the national championship game. Last season, the Hokies posted an 8-4 record and appeared in the Top 20 every week despite having to fill four offensive line spots, the quarterback job vacated by sensational underclassman Michael Vick and the tailback spot left open when All-America tailback Lee Suggs was lost for the season with an injury.

During the 2000 season, the Hokies posted an 11-1 record that included a 41-20 win over Clemson in the Gator Bowl. In 1999, Tech marched to an 11-0 regular-season mark before losing a hard-fought 46-29 game to Florida State for the national title in the Sugar Bowl. The Hokies ended that season ranked No. 2 by The Associated Press.

Another highlight of the Hokies' parade of bowl games came when Tech beat Texas, 28-10, in the 1995 Sugar Bowl and finished 10-2. The 1996 Hokies also finished 10-2, bowing to Nebraska, 41-21, in the Orange Bowl. In 1998, Tech registered a 9-3 mark, including a 38-7 win over Alabama in the first Music City Bowl game.

The Hokies posted a record of 7-5 in 1997 after losing to UNC in the Gator Bowl game. The bowl streak started in '93 when Tech beat Indiana in the Independence Bowl, 45-20, to cap a 9-3 season. The Hokies were 8-4 in 1994 after losing to Tennessee, 45-23, in the Gator Bowl.

Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1999 and 1995 and shared it in '96. Beamer was voted BIG EAST Coach of the Year by the league's coaches each of those seasons. In 1997, he was inducted into The Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame, and following the 1999 season, he earned eight national coach of the year honors.

Beamer returned to his alma mater in December 1986 after a six-year stint as the head coach at Murray State University, where he compiled a 42-23-2 mark. His 157-88-4 overall record ranks him sixth among active Division I-A coaches in wins.

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams. The 56-year-old Hillsville, Va., native began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Maryland in 1972. He held assistant coaching positions at The Citadel and Murray State before being named MSU's head coach in 1981.

**STABILITY AT THE TOP**

☛ One of the keys to the success of Virginia Tech football has been the stability of the program. That stability begins with head coach Frank Beamer.

Beamer, the first Tech alumnus to guide the Hokies' football program since the 1940s, has coached and won more football games at Tech than any other coach. His 15 years at the Hokie helm have helped the program develop a sense of stability and consistency currently enjoyed by just a handful of other Division I-A schools.

Only three of the 117 Division I-A head football coaches have been at their current school longer than Beamer. Those coaches are: Joe Paterno (36 yrs., Penn State); Bobby Bowden (26 yrs., Florida State); and Fisher DeBerry (18 yrs., Air Force).

**ACTIVE WINNERS**

☛ Frank Beamer is ranked sixth among the winningest active NCAA Division I-A football coaches with 157 career wins. Joe Paterno leads the way with 332 wins followed by Bobby Bowden (328), Lou Holtz (238), Jackie Sherrill (178) and Ken Hatfield (158).

**COACH WALT HARRIS**

☛ Walt Harris (Pacific '68) is in his sixth season as the head coach at Pittsburgh, where he has a 33-33 record. Harris began his collegiate coaching career as an assistant at Pacific in 1971. He held assistant coaching positions at California, Air Force, Michigan State, Illinois and Tennessee before becoming the head coach at Pacific in 1989. During three seasons as the head coach at his alma mater, Harris compiled an 11-24 record. He moved into the professional ranks as an assistant for the New York Jets from 1992-94. Harris served on the staff at Ohio State before taking the top job at Pittsburgh in December 1996.

**TECH IN THE POLLS**

☛Virginia Tech is ranked No. 3 in both The Associated Press Poll and in the *USA Today*/ESPN Coaches' Poll.

The Hokies posted their highest-ever football rankings during the 1999 and 2000 seasons. Tech finished the 1999 season rated No. 2 by AP and No. 3 by the coaches. In 2000, Tech climbed as high as No. 2 in both polls before finishing No. 6. Prior to the '99 season, Tech's previous high in the AP poll was 10th in the final 1995 poll that followed a 28-10 Sugar Bowl win over Texas. The Hokies had been ranked as high as No. 9 in the coaches' poll. Tech was ranked ninth by the coaches in the final poll of 1995, as well as four times during the '96 season. Tech's highest preseason rankings ever came last season when it was ranked No. 9 in both polls.

Tech has been ranked a total of 129 voting periods by the AP since the beginning of the 1993 season. When Coach Frank Beamer took over in 1987, Tech had been ranked a total of 12 weeks during the first 49 years of the AP poll. The Hokies have been ranked in 74 of the last 75 AP polls including the last 63 in a row.

**TECH IN THE BIG EAST**

☛Virginia Tech joined the BIG EAST Football Conference as a charter member when the league formed in 1991. Tech has finished among the top four in the league each year since the BIG EAST went to round-robin play in 1993. Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1999 and 1995 and shared the '96 championship with Miami and Syracuse. Tech finished second in 1994, 1997, 2000 and tied for second in 1998. The Hokies were fourth in '93. Last year, Tech tied for third in the league, marking just the second time in the last nine years that it did not finish higher than it was picked. Tech has won more games (91) than any BIG EAST team since the start of 1993.

**TECH AT HOME**

☛Virginia Tech has posted a 143-59-6 overall record in its 37-plus seasons at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. Tech is 69-22-1 at home under the direction of Frank Beamer.

Tech is 29-6 against BIG EAST teams at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. Since losing to Boston College at Lane Stadium in the opening game of the 1995 season, Tech has won 22 of its last 25 home BIG EAST games with the only league losses during that span coming to Temple, 28-24, in 1998 and to Syracuse, 22-14, and Miami, 26-24, last season.

Tech football teams are 302-90-13 in Blacksburg, including wins over Arkansas State, LSU, Marshall, Rutgers and Temple this season.

**THE KEYSTONE STATE**

☛Virginia Tech has a 27-7 mark in football games against teams from Pennsylvania. The Hokies are 7-2 versus Pittsburgh and 13-3 against Temple. During earlier football seasons, the Hokies faced Bucknell (0-1), Waynesburg (1-0), the University of Pennsylvania (1-1) and Villanova (5-0). Tech has posted a 17-2 record in Blacksburg against football teams from the state of Pennsylvania, including a 13-1 mark at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. The lone team from Pennsylvania to win at Lane Stadium was Temple in 1998. Tech is 18-4 versus teams from the Keystone State under Coach Frank Beamer.

**SCORING STREAK**

☛Tech has scored in a school record 90 straight football games, beginning with a 13-7 win over Miami on Sept. 23, 1995. The streak began after a 16-0 loss to Cincinnati in 1995. The previous record was 66 straight games, which started in 1970 and ran into the 1976 season. During their current streak, the Hokies have scored 13 or more points in all but two games.

**Tech Overcomes Turnovers To Hand Temple 20-10 Loss**

Oct. 26, 2002 • Lane Stadium/Worsham Field • Attendance 64,937

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Despite a sub-par offensive performance that included four turnovers, Virginia Tech remained undefeated with a 20-10 BIG EAST victory against Temple at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

The Hokies drove for a touchdown on their first possession of the game, but had trouble maintaining consistency on offense during the remainder of the contest. Tech had possessions ended by fumbles twice and tossed a pair of interceptions. Two of those turnovers came on the Tech side of the field, while one of the interceptions was returned to the Hokies' 26-yard line. A 32-yard touchdown catch by fullback Doug Easlick on the final play of the third quarter and two Nic Schmitt field goals proved just enough of an edge for Tech.

Once again, the Hokies' defense helped save the day, limiting the Owls to just 39 yards on the ground and intercepting three passes. Redshirt sophomore Vincent Fuller picked off passes at the Tech 8-yard line and in the end zone to stop a pair of Temple scoring threats. The Owls converted on just 3 of 12 third-down conversions against the Hokies and finished with 269 total yards.

**A CLOSER LOOK**

☛ Virginia Tech's win against Temple gave the Hokies their eighth straight win. It marks just the third time in school history that Tech has opened a season 8-0. The Hokies also won their first eight games in 1999 and 2000.

☛ Fullback **Doug Easlick's** 32-yard touchdown catch at the end of the third quarter was the longest pass reception of his Tech career.

☛ Tailback **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) hauled in a 30-yard pass during the Temple game, the longest catch of his Tech career. The catch was also the longest for a Tech tailback since 1997 when Lamont Pegues caught a 47-yard pass against Virginia.

☛ **Richard Johnson** (Baltimore, Md.) posted career-bests for pass receptions and receiving yards during the Temple game. The redshirt sophomore flanker caught four passes for 40 yards against the Owls.

☛ **Vincent Fuller** (Baltimore, Md.) intercepted two passes in the red zone to help the Hokies defeat Temple. It marked the third straight game in which Fuller has had at least one pass interception. The redshirt sophomore had one pick at the Owls' 8-yard line and another in the end zone.

☛ True freshman kicker **Nic Schmitt** (Salem, Va.) connected on a 21-yard field goal in the first half of the Temple game. It was his first successful field goal as a Hokie. He also had a 22-yarder in the fourth quarter and is now 2-for-5 overall.

☛ Redshirt freshman **James Anderson** (Chesapeake, Va.) made his first collegiate start and posted 11 tackles and a quarterback hurry. He was starting in place of injured linebacker **Vegas Robinson**.

**NOTING TECH-PITTSBURGH**

☛ Tech's loss to Pittsburgh last season gave the Hokies back-to-back regular-season losses for the first time since 1997. That year, Tech ended the regular season with losses at Pittsburgh and Virginia, then lost to North Carolina in the Gator Bowl.

☛ Tech's seven points in its loss to the Panthers marked the lowest point total for the Hokies since they scored just three points in a loss to North Carolina in the Gator Bowl on Jan. 1, 1998. The last time Tech had seven points or fewer in a regular-season game was in a 16-0 loss to Cincinnati during the 1995 season.

☛ Shawntae Spencer's 68-yard pass interception for a touchdown was the first interception for a TD against Tech since Miami's Edward Reed posted a 44-yard touchdown return last season. Spencer's return was the longest against Tech since 1995 when Cincinnati's Brad Jackson scored on a 71-yard interception.

☛ Tech's 15 yards rushing against the Panthers were the fewest for the Hokies since being held to minus-14 yards on the ground by Miami during the 1994 season.

☛ Junior **Ronyell Whitaker's** touchdown on a 71-yard return of a blocked field goal against Pittsburgh was the first TD of his Tech career. Whitaker (Norfolk, Va.) scored two points on a defensive PAT at Rutgers in 1999. The blocked field goal was the first field goal returned for a TD by Tech since 1993 when Antonio Banks had an 80-yard return for a touchdown in an Independence Bowl win over Indiana.

☛ Tech's 120 yards in penalties were the most by a Tech team since 1992 when the Hokies were penalized 122 yards during a 50-49 loss at Rutgers.

**Last Season**

**Pittsburgh Panthers Hand Hokies Second Straight Loss**

Nov. 3, 2001 • Heinz Field • Attendance 55,585

PITTSBURGH, Pa. — The University of Pittsburgh broke a 7-7 tie with 31 unanswered points to defeat Virginia Tech, 38-7, at new Heinz Field. The loss equalled Tech's worst-ever BIG EAST defeat, a 52-21 loss at Syracuse in 1996.

Pittsburgh struck for three touchdowns through the air on the way to a 24-7 halftime advantage. The Panthers finished with 393 total yards, including 245 passing. The Pittsburgh defense also played a major role, holding Tech to just 15 yards on the ground and 151 yards overall, and contributing an interception return for a touchdown.

Tech's only score came when Lamar Cobb blocked a field goal attempt and Ronyell Whitaker returned it 71 yards for a first-quarter touchdown. The Hokies were held to four first downs and 67 total yards in the first half. Tech hurt its own cause by committing 11 penalties and losing a pair of fumbles during the game.

### MAKING A DIFFERENCE

☛ Sophomore **Bryan Randall** (Williamsburg, Va.), who saw only limited action as Tech's top backup at quarterback last season, has already had a hand in seven wins in 2002, including three over nationally-ranked opponents. Randall came off the bench after the first two series to direct the Tech attack against LSU and made his first collegiate start against Marshall. He completed 10 of 11 passes for 119 yards in his first road game start at Texas A&M. He added 194 yards passing and 40 rushing during Tech's win at WMU.

In his first BIG EAST game at Boston College, Randall threw a 44-yard touchdown pass and scrambled for several key first downs. He came off the bench to run for two TDs and pass for another in Tech's opener against Arkansas State. He has connected on 67 of his 101 passing attempts (66.3 percent) for 890 yards and five touchdowns, while being intercepted five times. Randall has also contributed 216 yards and a pair of touchdowns on the ground.

### NOEL'S KNEE

☛ Quarterback **Grant Noel** (Ridgeley, W.Va.) opened his senior season as Tech's starter despite a torn ACL in his left knee. Noel, who took over the starting duties last season, injured his knee just days before the Hokies' 2002 spring game. Noel opted to forego surgery, which would likely have meant the end of his Tech playing career. Instead, he underwent conservative treatment involving a brace and rehabilitation.

After starting against Arkansas State and LSU, Noel underwent a 15-minute arthroscopic procedure on Sept. 3 to evaluate his left knee. During his procedure, doctors found a partially torn lateral meniscus, which was trimmed up along with the portion of the ACL that was torn during the spring. Noel's only action since has been limited to 12 snaps.

### BACKFIELD BACKGROUND

☛ The Rutgers' game marked the third time this season that both **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) and **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) broke the 100-yard rushing barrier in the same game. The only other time on record that feat has been accomplished in a single season was in 1986 when tailbacks Maurice Williams and Eddie Hunter both rushed for over 100 yards in games against Syracuse, Virginia and Richmond. During their Tech careers (1983-86), Williams and Hunter both gained over 100 yards in the same regular-season games four times. They also stand as the only Tech players ever to rush for over 100 yards in the same bowl game (1986 Peach Bowl). The only other Tech twosome since 1950 to accomplish the feat more than once in the same season was Phil Rogers and James Barber during the 1973 season. That year, Rogers and Barber both ran for over 100 yards in games against Virginia and Florida State. Suggs and Jones both topped the 100-yard mark against Boston College and Rutgers. The only other time since 1950 that the Hokies have had two players rush for 100 yards or more in the same game in back-to-back outings was in 1979. During that season, tailback Kenny Lewis and fullback Mickey Fitzgerald both surpassed 100 yards against Appalachian State, then the following game, Lewis and fellow tailback Cyrus Lawrence did it against William & Mary. Prior to 2002, Tech had not had the same two players accomplish the feat in consecutive games during the modern era.

☛ Suggs currently has 2,270 career yards rushing on 423 carries, an average of 5.4 yards per attempt. Jones has rushed for 1,661 yards on 294 carries, an average of 5.7 yards per carry. The most productive Tech twosome in terms of career rushing yardage has been tailbacks Maurice Williams (2,981) and Eddie Hunter (2,523) who combined for 5,504 rushing yards from 1983 through 1986. To date, the closest two Tech backs have come to both gaining 1,000 yards on the ground in the same season was in 1973 when Phil Rogers rushed for 1,036 yards and James Barber added 927 yards. Their combined 1,963 yards stand as a season record for two Tech players.

☛ **Lee Suggs** became the BIG EAST Conference's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns when he scored the first of his two touchdowns at Boston College. Suggs, who now has 43 career rushing touchdowns, passed former West Virginia standout Amos Zereoue who held the old mark of 38. Just one game earlier, Suggs became the BIG EAST's career leader in total touchdowns when he scored two TDs against Western Michigan. Suggs, who now has 45 career touchdowns (43 rushing, two receiving), broke the conference mark of 39 that was shared by William Green of Boston College and Zereoue. The Tech senior has scored at least one touchdown in each of the 21 games that he has started for the Hokies, including the 2001 Gator Bowl game. Suggs scored three touchdowns during that Gator Bowl contest against Clemson but under NCAA rules they don't count in his career total. That rule will change this season, but will not be retroactive. Suggs led the nation in scoring in 2000 when he scored 28 touchdowns.

**LEE AND KJ**

☛ Virginia Tech's tailback duo of senior **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) and sophomore **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) was ranked among the nation's best backfield combinations in many preseason publications. So far, they have lived up to their billing. During the Hokies' first eight games of the 2002 season, Suggs and Jones have rushed for 1,532 yards and scored a total of 21 touchdowns. Together, they are averaging 191.5 yards rushing per game and 5.8 yards per carry. Suggs has 145 carries for 828 yards so far this season and has scored 13 TDs. Jones has 119 carries for 704 yards and has eight touchdowns.

☛ **Lee Suggs** appears to have regained the form that helped him earn All-America honors in 2000. Suggs has made good showings in Tech's early-season games. He rushed for 91 yards and two touchdowns on 22 carries in the LSU game and had 24 carries for 153 yards and two TDs versus Marshall. Suggs ran for 154 yards and two TDs at Boston College before gaining a career-high 197 yards on the ground against Rutgers. He is averaging 5.7 yards per carry.

Suggs was lost to the Virginia Tech football team for the 2001 season after suffering a torn ACL in his left knee during the Hokies' 52-10 win over Connecticut. Suggs rushed for 99 yards and two touchdowns on 12 carries before injuring his knee in the third quarter.

Suggs made quite an impact in 2000, his first year as a starter. He finished first in the Division I-A ranks in scoring (15.27 ppg) and touchdowns (28) and led the BIG EAST Conference in both scoring and rushing (109.1 ypg).

Suggs' final rushing tally of 1,207 yards was the third-best single-season mark in school history and the best during coach Frank Beamer's 15 seasons. He tied a school season mark with six 100-yard games.

Suggs scored five TDs at UCF, and four versus both Rutgers and Virginia in 2000. He carried the football a total of 222 times without a fumble and was named third-team All-America by The Associated Press.

With his two touchdowns in the UConn game, Suggs established new Tech career records for both rushing touchdowns and total TDs. He currently ranks second on Tech's career scoring list with 270 points. Tech's all-time scoring leader is place-kicker Shayne Graham with 371 points.

Suggs' career rushing total of 2,270 yards ranks 10th at Tech. He needs 23 yards to jump into ninth place and 58 to take over eighth.

☛ Highly-touted **Kevin Jones** lived up to his billing during his first season with the Hokies, earning 2001 BIG EAST Rookie of the Year honors. The true freshman running back became a prominent figure in the Tech offense after Lee Suggs suffered a season-ending knee injury in the opening game.

Jones ended up in the starting lineup for the Hokies' last three regular-season games and the Gator Bowl. During the final three regular-season games, Jones contributed 155 yards rushing at Temple, 181 yards against Virginia and 160 yards versus No. 1 Miami. His 957 yards for the season led the team and set a school season mark for a freshman. He ranked fifth among Division I-A freshmen in rushing yards for the season and third among true freshmen. He was named a freshman All-American by *The Sporting News*.

This season, Jones has rushed for 70 yards and a TD against LSU and carried 24 times for 171 yards and three TDs versus Marshall. He scored another touchdown at WMU and added 144 yards rushing and a TD against Boston College. In Tech's win over Rutgers, he registered 132 yards on the ground and scored on a 58-yard run.

**WHAT'S A HOKIE?**

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

**BEAMERBALL**

☛During the Frank Beamer era at Tech, putting points on the scoreboard has always been a team effort — the offensive team, the defensive team and the special teams. It's called BeamerBall, and what sets it apart are the contributions of the defense and special teams.

Each of Tech's last eight teams is ranked among the school's top 10 highest scoring teams. During that time, a player at every position on the defensive unit has produced at least one touchdown. And 21 different players have scored touchdowns while playing on Tech's special teams. Altogether, the defense and special teams have combined for 75 TDs since Beamer arrived in 1987, including 58 in Tech's last 106 games.

Under Beamer, Tech's defense has scored 47 TDs, with 27 coming on pass interceptions, 18 on fumble returns and two on fumble recoveries. The special teams have added 28 TDs, including 13 on blocked punts, nine on punt returns, three on kickoff returns, two on blocked field goals and one on a fumble recovery.

Fittingly, the trend started in Beamer's first game as Tech's head coach when true freshman Jon Jeffries returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Clemson. It was the Hokies' first touchdown under Beamer, and it was scored on special teams.

Under Beamer, a total of 55 different players on Tech's defense and special teams have scored touchdowns. Twelve of those players — Don Stokes, Jock Jones, Roger Brown, Lawrence Lewis, Antonio Banks, Jim Baron, Keion Carpenter, Pierson Prioleau, Anthony Midget, Cory Bird and Kevin McCadam — scored twice. **DeAngelo Hall**, Ike Charlton and Ricky Hall have three scores and André Davis four.

Since the start of the 1993 season, Tech is 39-5 in games it scores at least one TD on defense or special teams.

**BEAMERBALL II**

☛ Virginia Tech's tradition for blocking kicks is another part of BeamerBall. It was carried to new heights in 1998 with 10 blocks during the regular season and two more in the Hokies' Music City Bowl game against Alabama. Tech now has 94 blocks in Beamer's 182 games as the head coach. The Hokies have blocked 48 punts (13 for TDs), 25 field goals and 21 extra points.

☛ Tech blocked more kicks in the 1990s than any other Division I-A team. The Hokies blocked 63 kicks during the decade — 31 punts, 18 PATs and 14 FGs. Tech has started the new decade with 19 blocks.

☛ The most prolific kick blockers under Beamer have been defensive lineman Bernard Basham and safety Keion Carpenter who each posted six blocks during their Tech careers. Basham blocked three field goals and three PATs, while Carpenter blocked six punts.

☛ The teams Tech has victimized the most during Frank Beamer's 16-seasons have been Pittsburgh, WVU and Miami. During that span, the Hokies have blocked nine kicks against the Panthers and eight versus the Mountaineers and 'Canes.

☛ Since joining the BIG EAST Conference in 1991, the Hokies have posted at least three blocked kicks against every team in the league. During that span, Tech has blocked nine kicks against Pittsburgh, eight versus Miami, six against WVU, five versus Rutgers, four against BC and three against Syracuse and Temple.

☛ During the Beamer era, Tech has blocked two kicks in a game 17 times, including two against No. 14 LSU this season. Tech blocked two kicks against four different teams in 1998.

**GOOD COMPETITION**

☛ Strong competition continues to keep players on their toes at several positions on the Virginia Tech depth chart, including the rover and whip linebacker spots and tight end.

Senior **Billy Hardee** (Winter Haven, Fla.) and redshirt junior **Michael Crawford** (Baltimore, Md.) took turns holding the top spot at the rover position during the preseason before Crawford got the starting nod prior to the opener. Crawford turned in his best game at Texas A&M with five tackles, a tackle for loss, a sack, a fumble caused and a pass broken up. Hardee had six tackles, a fumble recovery and a pass broken up against WMU. Crawford has 29 tackles and two sacks for the year, while Hardee has 20 tackles.

**Mike Daniels** (Fairfax, Va.), who started the final four games of the 2001 season at whip linebacker, is battling fellow redshirt sophomore **Brandon Manning** (Harrisburg, Pa.) for the starting duties this fall. Manning has started seven of Tech's eight games this season and is third on the team in tackles with 45. Daniels, who was slowed during the preseason by a hamstring injury, started the Marshall game and has a total of 27 tackles for the season.

Redshirt junior **Keith Willis** (Norfolk, Va.) has started all eight games at tight end after working behind veterans Browning Wynn and Bob Slowikowski the past two seasons. Willis has increased his bench press to 390 pounds, best among the tight ends, and leads the position with a 32-inch vertical jump. He has four receptions for 49 yards on the season.

Redshirt freshman **Jeff King** (Pulaski, Va.) has also seen a substantial amount of playing time at the position and caught a TD pass against ASU. **Jared Mazzetta** (Flemington, N.J.), who was slowed by a preseason ankle injury, caught a 19-yard pass against Rutgers.

**ROBINSON SIDELINED**

☛ Starting inside linebacker **Vegas Robinson** (Chesapeake, Va.) missed the Temple game with an ankle injury and is expected to sit out Saturday night's game against Pittsburgh. Robinson, who took over the backer spot vacated by Ben Taylor has been a key ingredient in the success of the Hokies' defense.

Robinson, who saw action on just 78 defensive plays last year, has been in on 336 plays this season. He is fourth on the team in tackles with 42 and has also contributed two pass interceptions, two tackles for loss, two fumble recoveries and a pair of quarterback hurries.

☛ Virginia Tech's defensive secondary features an experienced cast of performers led by senior returning starters **Ronyell Whitaker** (Norfolk, Va.) and **Willie Pile** (Alexandria, Va.) and dynamic sophomore **DeAngelo Hall** (Chesapeake, Va.).

Prior to the season, the Tech secondary was rated among the nation's best by several preseason magazines, but the loss of versatile junior **Eric Green** (Clewiston, Fla.) with a season-ending knee injury and the suspension of Whitaker for two games forced the Hokies to shuffle their lineup. During Whitaker's absence, secondary coach Lorenzo Ward started promising sophomore free safety **Vincent Fuller** (Baltimore, Md.) at the field corner spot were Whitaker and Green were both working. Fuller and experienced redshirt junior **Garnell Wilds** (Tampa, Fla.) combined to solidify the position. Fuller has been outstanding with 17 tackles, six pass breakups and a team-leading four interceptions. Wilds has 26 tackles, three breakups and a key fumble recovery. Whitaker returned to the starting lineup against Marshall, but Fuller continues to see significant playing time.

Pile, who is in his third season as a starter, has been rated as one of the top free safeties in Division I-A for the second straight year. He is second on the team with 47 tackles and has two interceptions. Pile, one of the Hokies' top big-play men, also has a pair of fumble recoveries.

Hall, the starting boundary corner, was listed as the best athlete in the BIG EAST by *Street & Smith's* preseason magazine and showed why by returning a punt and an interception for touchdowns in Tech's opening game. Hall leads the cornerbacks with 30 tackles. He leads the team in pass breakups with seven and is second in interceptions with three.

**DON'T FORGET THESE GUYS**

☛ Virginia Tech's tailbacks and defensive backfield have been rated among the best units in the nation, but it's hard to overlook the Hokies' defensive ends.

This year's group of ends ranks with the best Tech has had. The veteran group includes redshirt junior **Nathaniel Adibi** (Hampton, Va.), who has played in 32 games, 28 as a starter; senior **Lamar Cobb** (Hurt, Va.), who has played in 35 games, 20 as a starter; redshirt junior **Cols Colas** (Plantation, Fla.), who has played in 30 games, nine as a starter; and junior **Jim Davis** (Highland Springs, Va.), who has played in 29 games, seven as a starter.

Last season, those four players combined for 49 quarterback hurries and 11 of the Hokies' 30 sacks. This season, they have already produced 49 hurries and 19 sacks in just eight games.

Davis is a play-maker who is trying to shake a nagging ankle injury. Last year, he tied for the team lead in sacks with 4.5, intercepted a pass and returned it for a touchdown and forced two fumbles that were returned for TDs. He has 21 tackles, 5.5 sacks, seven total tackles for loss, nine hurries and three passes batted down so far in 2002.

Adibi has been one of the standouts on this year's young defense. He has already surpassed his career high with seven sacks. He has 24 tackles, 13 hurries and has forced two fumbles, one of which was returned for a TD.

Colas' power and explosive speed – 390 bench press and 4.41 forty – make him hard to handle on the corner. He has 17 hurries, 5.5 sacks and 11 total tackles for loss so far this season to go with 22 tackles.

Cobb led the ends in tackles last year with 46. He currently has 10 hurries, a sack and 19 tackles.

Fast-rising true freshman **Darryl Tapp** (Chesapeake, Va.) has contributed 17 tackles and three hurries.

**ON THE RECEIVING END**

☛ A lot of attention was paid to the receiving positions during the spring and preseason as Tech looked to replace veteran wideouts André Davis and Emmett Johnson.

A variety of players have seen action in Tech's first eight games with redshirt junior **Ernest Wilford** (Richmond, Va.) and seniors **Shawn Witten** (Elizabethton, Tenn.) and **Terrell Parham** (Bartow, Fla.) leading the way. Wilford tops the team with 19 catches for 357 yards and two touchdowns. Witten has 11 catches for 152 yards and Parham eight for 60.

**Richard Johnson** (r-So.; Baltimore, Md.) got his first start as a Hokie at Western Michigan and has been coming on strong in recent games with a total of eight catches for 81 yards.

Newcomer **Justin Hamilton** (Clintwood, Va.), a redshirt freshman who was moved from tailback during the spring, has four catches for 49 yards. **Mike Imoh** (Fr.; Fairfax, Va.) saw brief action at flanker catching four passes for 28 yards and a TD, but has since moved to tailback.

**CLEARING THE WAY**

☛ Leading the charge for Tech's highly-touted running backs is an offensive line that ranks among the largest in school history. The unit is anchored by 6-3, 292-pound **Jake Grove** (r-Jr.; Forest, Va.) who moved to center this year after starting every game at guard in 2001. Grove has been outstanding, earning a spot in the Winner's Circle every game with a grade of over 80 percent. He has posted 28 knockdown blocks.

Also back from last year's starting lineup are 6-4, 322-pound left tackle **Anthony Davis** (Victoria, Va.) and 6-3, 310-pound right guard **Luke Owens** (Grundy, Va.). Davis, who has joined Grove in the Winner's Circle every game, shares the team lead with 28 knockdowns, while Owens has 20.

**Jon Dunn** (r-So.; Virginia Beach, Va.), the 6-7, 319-pound right tackle is making big strides with 19 knockdown blocks. Six-four, 302-pound **Jacob Gibson** (r-Jr.; Rocky Mount, Va.) and 6-6, 304-pound **James Miller** (So.; Pompano Beach, Fla.) have both gotten starts at left guard. Gibson has 27 knockdowns.

### FRESH FACES

☞Twelve true freshmen have dressed for the Hokies this season. True freshmen who dress on offense are tackles **Reggie Butler** (Keswick, Va.) and **Jimmy Martin** (Fairfax, Va.), center **Danny McGrath** (Herndon, Va.), tailback **Mike Imoh** (Fairfax, Va.), quarterback **Marcus Vick** (Newport News, Va.) and tailback **John Candelas** (Blacksburg, Va.). The true freshmen on defense who are dressing are end **Darryl Tapp** (Chesapeake, Va.), tackle **Jonathan Lewis** (Richmond, Va.), cornerback **Cary Wade** (Fairfax, Va.) and safety **Jimmy F. Williams** (Hampton, Va.). Kickers **Nic Schmitt** (Salem, Va.) and **Brandon Pace** (Virginia Beach, Va.) round out the group. All but Vick and Pace have played.

☞The busiest of the true freshmen are defensive tackle **Jonathan Lewis** and defensive end **Darryl Tapp**. Lewis has been in on 187 plays at tackle and 27 on special teams. Tapp, who is a starter on five different special teams, has played 180 plays on special teams and 87 snaps at end.

### THE OTHER BACKS

☞While tailbacks **Lee Suggs** and **Kevin Jones** are stealing all the headlines, **Doug Easlick** (r-Jr.; Marlton, N.J.), **Cedric Humes** (r-Fr.; Virginia Beach, Va.) and **Josh Spence** (r-So.; Riner, Va.) are quietly handling the fullback duties.

All three have seen action with Easlick getting the starting nod in all eight games. Easlick has rushed 11 times for 52 yards and caught eight passes for 54 yards and one TD. Humes, who worked some at both fullback and tailback during the Arkansas State game, has rushed for 68 yards on 16 carries. He also has four pass receptions for 28 yards. Spence has also seen action, rushing four times for 26 yards and catching a pass for an 18-yard gain.

### BIG EAST HONORS

☞Senior free safety **Willie Pile** (Alexandria, Va.) was named the BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Week following Tech's win at Texas A&M. Pile led the Hokies with 10 tackles, including five solo hits. He also intercepted a pass and returned it 17 yards to set up Tech's go-ahead field goal. Pile added a fumble recovery that he returned 31 yards.

☞Sophomore tailback **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) was named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week for his showing against No. 16 Marshall. Jones carried 24 times for 171 yards and three touchdowns in Tech's 47-21 win. Two of his TDs came in the first half to help the Hokies build a 20-0 lead.

☞**Mikal Baaqee** (Columbia, Md.) was named BIG EAST Co-Defensive Player of the Week after the Hokies' win against Marshall. The redshirt sophomore linebacker set up Tech's second touchdown with an interception. He also contributed three solo tackles, six assists and a pass broken up.

☞Junior defensive end **Jim Davis** (Highland Springs, Va.) was named BIG EAST Co-Defensive Player of the Week after posting six tackles, three sacks and two hurries against LSU. Davis was the first Tech player to have three sacks in a game since 1999 when rover Cory Bird had three versus Boston College.

☞Punter **Vinnie Burns** (New Orleans, La.) enjoyed his best career punting day as a Hokie against a team from his home state. Burns was named the BIG EAST Special Teams Player of the Week after averaging a personal-best 44.7 yards per punt against LSU. Four of Burns' nine punts covered 50 yards or more and four were placed inside the Tigers' 20-yard line.

☞Tailback **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) earned BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week honors after rushing for a career-high 197 yards in a win over Rutgers. Suggs averaged 9.4 yards on 21 carries and scored two touchdowns on runs of 3 and 42 yards.

☞Sophomore **DeAngelo Hall** (Chesapeake, Va.) was named BIG EAST Co-Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance as a punt returner against Rutgers. Hall had five returns for 74 yards. He iced the win with a 51-yard return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter.

### TWO-MINUTE DRILL

☞Virginia Tech and Pittsburgh rank fifth and eighth, respectively, among Division I-A teams in total defense this season.

☞The Hokies and Panthers are tied for 12th nationally in fumbles recovered with 12 each.

☞Tech and Pittsburgh stand first and second, respectively, in the BIG EAST in total defense, scoring defense and time of possession.

☞Virginia Tech is ranked 10th nationally in rushing offense, while Pittsburgh is rated eighth in both punting and kickoff returns.

☞The Hokies lead Division I-A in scoring defense (10.75 ppg), while the Panthers are 10th (15.50 ppg).

☞Virginia Tech is trying to start a season 9-0 for just the second time in school history. Tech started 9-0 in 1999.

☞Tech receiver **Shawn Witten** (Elizabethton, Tenn.) suffered a broken leg during the first quarter of last year's game at Pittsburgh and missed the Hokies' last three regular-season games and the Gator Bowl.

☛ Tech's 63-consecutive appearances in the AP Poll represent the second-longest active streak behind Michigan.

☛ **Nathaniel Adibi** (Hampton, Va.) is one of 10 semi-finalists for the Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year Award.

☛ Texas A&M's 3-0 first-quarter lead marks the only time this year that Tech has trailed in a game.

☛ Since the beginning of the 1993 season, Tech is 68-11 in games that it scores first and 23-14 in games that the opposing team scores first.

☛ Tech's **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) is ranked 13th nationally in scoring with an average of 9.75 points per game.

☛ **DeAngelo Hall** (Chesapeake, Va.) is currently tied for 16th nationally in punt returns with an average of 15.06 yards per return.

☛ Since the start of BIG EAST Conference round-robin play in 1993, Tech is 63-3 when it rushes for 200 yards or more.

☛ Tech's top tacklers on special teams have been sophomore **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) and redshirt freshman **Jordan Trott** (Torrance, Calif.) with eight tackles each.

☛ Senior tailback **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) lost a fumble in the third quarter of the Rutgers game, his first lost fumble since 1999. Before the fumble, Suggs had a streak of 381 consecutive carries in the regular season and 401 overall carries, including the 2001 Gator Bowl, without losing a fumble.

☛ Forty-six of the last 51 passes caught by Virginia Tech tight ends have produced first downs.

### Extra Points

☛ Tech has allowed just 17 points in the first half of play this season, with the first touchdown coming on a punt return by Boston College and the second on a pass by Rutgers. The Hokies have outscored their opponents 161-17 in the first half and 201-41 during the first three quarters of play. Since the beginning of the 1993 season, Tech has posted a 75-5 record in games when it is leading at the half. During that same stretch, the Hokies are 7-0 in games when the score is tied at the half and 9-20 in contests when they have trailed at the half. Tech has won the last 34 games it has led at halftime.

☛ Free safety **Willie Pile** (Alexandria, Va.) was named the Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in Tech's 13-3 victory at Texas A&M. Pile had 10 tackles in the game, including five solo hits. He also contributed an interception and a fumble recovery. Pile returned the interception 17 yards and advanced the fumble 31 yards. Pile has been added to the watch list for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, which will be presented on Dec. 9.

☛ Virginia Tech's win at Texas A&M was the first by a non-conference team at A&M's Kyle Field during Aggie coach R.C. Slocum's 13-plus seasons at the helm. Texas A&M had posted 29 consecutive victories against non-conference teams in College Station under Slocum. The last non-conference team to win at Kyle Stadium was Alabama in 1988.

☛ Former high school teammates **Jason Lallis** (Mitchellville, Md.) and **Mikal Baaqee** (Columbia, Md.) made their first Tech starts in the same game. Lallis opened at tackle and Baaqee at mike linebacker against Arkansas State. The two players entered Tech together after starring at DeMatha High School. Both players had an impact on the Arkansas State game. Lallis picked up an ASU fumble in the second quarter and rambled 59 yards for a touchdown. Baaqee forced a pass interception that teammate **DeAngelo Hall** (Chesapeake, Va.) returned for a TD and earned the most points on defense.

☛ During the Arkansas State game, sophomore **DeAngelo Hall** (Chesapeake, Va.) became the first player in coach Frank Beamer's 15-plus seasons at Tech to score a touchdown on defense and a touchdown on special teams in the same game. Hall scored on a 69-yard punt return and a 49-yard interception return during the first quarter of the ASU game.

☛ Brothers **Kevin** and **Jonathan Lewis** (Richmond, Va.) played side-by-side at defensive tackle for the first time at Tech during the Arkansas State game. Kevin, a redshirt sophomore starter, posted six tackles including a sack which forced a fumble that was returned for a touchdown. Jonathan, a true freshman, played 22 downs and was in on five tackles. They are the first brothers to play side-by-side at Tech since offensive linemen T.J. and Todd Washington in 1995 and 1996.

### MORE ON TECH-PITTSBURGH

☛ Virginia Tech's first scoring drive during its 37-34 win against Pittsburgh during the 2000 season took 5:03. The Panthers' five scoring drives combined took a total of 5:58. Pittsburgh had three scoring drives in the game that took 31 seconds or less. Tech controlled the football for 36:52 of the game, which at the time was the most time of possession ever for the Hokies in a BIG EAST game. That mark was broken last season when Tech controlled the football for 37:56 in a BIG EAST win against Boston College.

☛ Tech compiled 30 first downs against the Panthers in 2000. That equalled the third-highest single-game total in school history. The Hokies also had 30 first downs in games against Virginia in 1992 and Houston in 1972. Tech finished with 31 first downs at Pittsburgh in 1993 and had a school record 34 first downs against Akron in 1991.

☛ **Ernest Wilford** (Richmond, Va.) made his first collegiate start in the 2000 Pittsburgh game. Wilford moved into the starting flanker spot for André Davis (Niskayuna, N.Y.) who was sidelined by bursitis in his left foot.

☛ Tech kicker **Carter Warley** (Richmond, Va.) was named the BIG EAST Special Teams Player of the Week after kicking a game-winning 27-yard field goal with 16 seconds remaining to beat Pittsburgh during the 2000 season. Warley was 3-for-4 on field goals during the game and finished with 13 points.

☛ Defensive tackle David Pugh (Madison Heights, Va.) blocked Pittsburgh's first extra point attempt of the game. It marked Tech's eighth blocked kick of the 2000 season and the Hokies' eighth blocked kick overall in their series with the Panthers.

☛ Virginia Tech held Pittsburgh to minus-12 yards rushing, but gave up a season-high 427 yards passing during their 1999 meeting. At the time, the Panthers' rushing total was the lowest against Tech in a BIG EAST game. Their passing total, on the other hand, was the second-highest against the Hokies in a conference game. Boston College had 448 yards passing against Tech during the 1993 season.

☛ Pittsburgh was the first team during the '99 season to score points on Tech in the third quarter of play. The Hokies and Panthers met in the seventh game of the season.

☛ Tech blocked its first punt of the season in the first quarter of the 1999 Pittsburgh game when André Davis (Niskayuna, N.Y.) blocked the Panthers' first attempt of the game. Tech blocked more kicks against Pittsburgh during the 1990s (7) than against any other team.

☛ Place-kicker Shayne Graham (Dublin, Va.) booted a 52-yard field goal in the '99 Pittsburgh game — the longest ever for a Tech player in a BIG EAST game and the second-longest of Graham's Tech career. Tech's previous record in a league game was a 49-yard kick by Graham against Syracuse at the Carrier Dome during the 1998 season.

☛ Virginia Tech posted nine quarterback sacks during its 1998 game against Pittsburgh, the most sacks by the Hokies in a single game during **Frank Beamer's** 15-plus years as the head coach. Tech repeated that feat against the Panthers once again during a 30-17 victory at Pittsburgh in 1999.

☛ Tech held Pittsburgh to just 29 yards rushing during its 27-7 win against the Panthers during the 1998 season.

☛ Free safety Keion Carpenter (Baltimore, Md.) intercepted three passes against the Panthers in 1998 to tie school and BIG EAST Conference records.

☛ Fullback Jarrett Ferguson (Goodview, Va.) made his first collegiate start in Tech's '98 win over Pittsburgh.

☛ Tight end Bob Slowikowski, a native of Pittsburgh, made his first collegiate pass reception against the Panthers in 1998. Slowikowski helped set up Tech's second touch-down of the game with a 16-yard catch in the first quarter.

☛ Corey Moore (Brownsville, Tenn.) blocked a field goal and Larry Austin (Norfolk, Va.) blocked a punt in Tech's 27-7 win against Pittsburgh in 1998. During the Hokies' '97 visit to Pitt Stadium, Moore and John Engelberger (Springfield, Va.) both blocked extra point kicks against the Panthers. In 1995, Tech got two blocked punts from Angelo Harrison (Spotsylvania, Va.) at Pitt Stadium. The Hokies have blocked at least one kick against the Panthers in five of their last six meetings, including the last four in a row.

☛ Pittsburgh compiled 492 yards of total offense against the Hokies at Pitt Stadium in 1997. At the time, it was the highest total versus Tech since the 1994 Gator Bowl when Tennessee gained 495 yards.

☛ Cornerback Anthony Midget (Clewiston, Fla.) picked up a fumble and returned it 22 yards for a touch-down against Pittsburgh in '97.

☛ Tech's 312 yards passing at Pittsburgh in 1995 still stands as the Hokies' highest passing output away from home since 1991 when they passed for 320 yards in a 33-20 loss to Florida State in Orlando.

☛Tech had to come from behind to beat Pittsburgh during the 1996 and 1995 seasons. The Panthers led 17-13 in the third quarter of the '96 game before the Hokies rallied for three unanswered touchdowns. During the 1995 season, Tech trailed the Panthers, 16-10, heading into the fourth quarter. The Hokies scored a touchdown at the 10:42 mark to take the lead and added a pair of field goals.

☛Tech was the first team from the commonwealth of Virginia to beat the University of Pittsburgh in football. The Panthers entered the schools' 1993 game with an 8-0 record against teams from the Old Dominion. The Hokies won that game, 63-21.

☛The Hokies broke several school and BIG EAST offensive marks on the way to a 63-21 win at Pittsburgh in the schools' first-ever football meeting in 1993. Tech compiled a school record 675 yards of offense and set school and league marks for rushing yards with 500. The 63 points were the most ever for the Hokies on an opposing team's home field.

☛The 72 rushing attempts by Tech during the 1993 game at Pittsburgh still stands as a BIG EAST single-game record.

#### PLAYERS FROM PA.

☛Virginia Tech has six players on its roster from Pennsylvania, led by sophomore tailback **Kevin Jones** from Chester and starting outside linebacker **Brandon Manning** from Harrisburg. Backup center **Robert Ramsey** is from Coraopolis, while reserve defensive end **Bob Ruff** is from McMurray. **Fred Lee**, a freshman wide receiver from Harrisburg, is being redshirted, while freshman **Adrian White** of Ardmore is currently playing on the Hokies' scout and jayvee teams.

#### NIGHT GAMES

☛Since 1946, Virginia Tech football teams have a 64-48-1 mark in night games, including a 31-15-1 record under Coach Frank Beamer. Tech has won 22 of its last 24 regular-season night games. The Hokies have a 14-2 record in night games against BIG EAST opponents. Tech is 2-0 in night games this season.

#### YOUTH MOVEMENT

☛Of the 76 Virginia Tech players who have seen playing time so far this season, 44 are freshmen or sophomores. The overall breakdown is 10 true freshmen, 14 redshirt freshmen, 20 sophomores, 19 juniors and 13 seniors. Of the 71 players who dressed for Tech's season-opening game against Arkansas State, 28 were dressing for the first time.

☛Of the 11 players who got some work at defensive tackle during the preseason, seven were true freshmen or redshirt freshmen. Only three of the players had seen any varsity action at the position. Redshirt junior **Mark Costen** (Virginia Beach, Va.) played in six games last year as a reserve and was in for 71 plays. **Kevin Lewis** (Richmond, Va.) saw action on 125 plays as a freshman in 2000, then was redshirted last year. **Jason Lallis** (r-So.; Mitchellville, Md.) was primarily an end until playing a few downs at tackle late last season. Lallis and Lewis have started all eight games this season and currently rank fifth and sixth, respectively, on the team in tackles. Lallis has 35 tackles, two sacks, six hurries and a blocked kick. He also returned a fumble caused by Lewis 59 yards for a touchdown. Lewis has 34 tackles, a sack and six hurries.

☛Tech's kickoff team features seven freshmen, including true freshmen **Jimmy Williams** (Hampton, Va.), **Cary Wade** (Fairfax, Va.) and **Darryl Tapp** (Chesapeake, Va.).

**SIDELINES**

☛Thirteen of Virginia Tech's last 20 touchdown drives have covered more than 70 yards, with eight covering more than 80 yards. The Hokies had touchdown drives of 90, 22, 85, 73, 81 and 46 yards against Marshall. Tech's lone touchdown drive at Texas A&M was 86 yards, while its TD drives at WMU were 68, 84 and 77 yards. During the Boston College game, Tech put together scoring drives of 81, 75, 74 and 75 yards. Against Rutgers, the Hokies drove 80, 36, 59 and 89 yards for TDs. Tech had two short drives versus Temple.

☛Tech's rushing defense is ranked No. 1 in NCAA Division I-A statistics, allowing just 40.8 yards per game. The Hokies have held all eight opponents this season to less than 85 yards on the ground. The Hokies are also ranked No. 1 in scoring defense at 10.75 points per game. Tech has finished among the top 20 Division I-A teams in rushing defense six of the last seven seasons and has been ranked among the top 15 teams in scoring defense six times in the past seven years.

☛Tech ranks sixth nationally in turnover margin at plus-1.63 per game. The Hokies are tied for sixth in turnovers gained with 25 and tied for 12th nationally in fumbles recovered with 12. Tech has committed a total of 12 turnovers.

☛Virginia Tech's three-game road sweep of No. 19 Texas A&M, Western Michigan and Boston College marked just the second time in school history that a Tech football team won three consecutive games played on opposing teams' home fields during a single season. The only other Tech team to accomplish the feat was the 1955 team that won successive road games at Pennsylvania (33-0), William & Mary (14-7) and Florida State (24-20).

☛Redshirt junior kicker **Carter Warley** (Richmond, Va.), who is 20-for-20 on extra points and 5 of 8 on field goals in 2002, will be sidelined for an undetermined amount of time while being treated for low back pain. Warley's off-and-on bout with back pain kept him on the sidelines during the first half of the Western Michigan game. He entered the contest to kick two extra points in the second half. **Jon Mollerup** (Lyndhurst, Va.) kicked in the first half of the WMU game. Mollerup was 1-for-2 on both extra points and field goals. Prior to the BC game, Coach Frank Beamer tabbed true freshman **Nic Schmitt** (Salem, Va.) as Warley's replacement. Schmitt has made all 11 of his PAT kicks and is 2-for-5 on field goals. This marks the first time in more than 45 years that three kickers have scored points in a season.

**Fast Start Leads To 63-7 Tech Win Over Arkansas State**

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Virginia Tech scored 35 points in the first quarter on the way to a 63-7 season-opening victory against Arkansas State in the Hispanic College Fund Football Classic at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Sophomore DeAngelo Hall scored two of Tech's first three touchdowns, returning a punt 69 yards for the Hokies' first score and racing 49 yards with an interception for the team's third TD. Defensively, the Hokies held ASU to 24 yards on the ground and 227 yards overall. Tech's offense accounted for 387 total yards, including 288 yards rushing.

**A CLOSER LOOK**

☛Virginia Tech's 56 points in the first half against Arkansas State marked the most points in a half for a Tech squad during the modern era (since 1950). It also ranked as the second-highest point total in a half by a BIG EAST Conference team behind the 59 points scored by West Virginia against Rutgers last season. The Hokies' 35 first-quarter points against the Indians tied modern day school and BIG EAST Conference marks for points in a quarter.

☛Tech's 63 points in the ASU game were the most points scored by the Hokies in a season opening game since Tech defeated Roanoke College 86-0 to open the 1905 season. The last time Tech scored more points in a game was a 77-27 win over Akron in 1995.

☛Each of the Hokies' first four touchdowns against ASU were scored in a different manner. Tech scored on a punt return, a rushing play, an interception and a pass play. The Hokies also had a fumble return for a TD later in the game. Special teams, offense and defense each contributed one of Tech's first three scores.

☛Eleven Tech players made their first collegiate starts in the Arkansas State game. The first-time starters on offense were guard **James Miller** (Pompano Beach, Fla.), tackle **Jon Dunn** (Virginia Beach, Va.), tight end **Keith Willis** (Norfolk, Va.) and fullback **Doug Easlick** (Marlton, N.J.). Starting for the first time on defense were tackles **Kevin Lewis** (Richmond, Va.) and **Jason Lallis** (Mitchellville, Md.), linebackers **Brandon Manning** (Harrisburg, Pa.), **Vegas Robinson** (Chesapeake, Va.) and **Mikal Baaqee** (Columbia, Md.), rover **Michael Crawford** (Baltimore, Md.) and cornerback **Vincent Fuller** (Baltimore, Md.).

**Hokies Post Victory Over Defending SEC Champs LSU**

Sept. 1, 2002 • Lane Stadium/Worsham Field • Attendance 65,049

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Sixteenth-ranked Virginia Tech used a strong defense and an opportunistic offense to defeat No. 14 Louisiana State, 26-8, in front of a state-record crowd of 65,049 at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Tech capitalized on good field position to build a 14-0 advantage in the first half. A 17-yard punt return by sophomore DeAngelo Hall put the Hokies at the LSU 27 late in the first quarter. From there, it took Tech just six plays to score its first touchdown. A blocked punt gave the Hokies the football at the LSU 29 less than two minutes into the second quarter. A 6-yard TD run by Lee Suggs capped a four-play drive.

Defensively, the Hokies kept the pressure on LSU quarterback Matt Mauck, registering four quarterback sacks and 14 hurries. Tech limited the Tigers to 80 yards on the ground and 214 yards overall. LSU converted on just one of 13 third-down plays during the contest. A pass interception by linebacker Vegas Robinson set up Tech's last touchdown.

Suggs led the Hokies with 91 yards rushing and two touchdowns on 22 carries.

**A CLOSER LOOK**

☛ Louisiana State, which was ranked 14th in the Associated Press poll, was the highest-ranked team in the AP poll that Virginia Tech has defeated since a 28-10 win over No. 9 Texas in the 1995 Sugar Bowl game. The last time Tech beat a higher ranked team in Blacksburg was during the 1964 season when the Hokies downed No. 10-ranked Florida State by a score of 20-11. That game was played at Miles Stadium.

☛ The attendance of 65,049 for the Tech-LSU game set new state and Tech records for the largest crowd to see a football game. The previous attendance record for the commonwealth of Virginia was 61,625 set during last season's game between Virginia Tech and Virginia in Charlottesville. The former Tech mark was set during the 2000 season when all six home games were sell-outs of 56,272.

☛ Redshirt freshman **Justin Hamilton** (Clintwood, Va.) and redshirt sophomore **Jason Lallis** (Mitchellville, Md.) both blocked punts during the Hokies' win over LSU. Hamilton's block in the second quarter set up Tech's second touchdown of the game, while Lallis' block in the fourth quarter resulted in a safety. It marked the 17th time in Frank Beamer's tenure as head coach that the special teams unit posted two blocks in a game.

☛ Only three players had rushing carries for the Hokies during the LSU game. The last time Tech only had three players carry the football in a game was during a 1994 game with Virginia.

☛ Tech's 231 yards of total offense against LSU ranks as the lowest total for the Hokies in a victory since gaining just 206 yards during a 1999 win at Pittsburgh.

**Game 3**

**Tech Rushes To 47-21 Victory Against Thundering Herd**

Sept. 12, 2002 • Lane Stadium/Worsham Field • Attendance 65,049

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Tailbacks Kevin Jones and Lee Suggs combined for 324 yards rushing and five touchdowns as No. 11 Virginia Tech posted a convincing 47-21 win against No. 16 Marshall in a Thursday night ESPN game at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

While the Tech defense was holding Marshall quarterback Byron Leftwich in check, Jones and Suggs helped the Hokies pile up a 33-0 lead before the Herd got on the scoreboard with three fourth-quarter touchdowns. Jones rushed for 171 yards and three touchdowns, while Suggs added 153 yards and a pair of TDs.

Defensively, Tech was at its best when it mattered, holding Marshall to just 234 yards during the first three quarters. The offense helped out with four touchdown drives of more than 70 yards, including a 15-play, 85-yard drive that took up more than eight minutes on the clock.

**A CLOSER LOOK**

☛Prior to the kickoff of the Marshall game, Tech head coach Frank Beamer's jersey was retired. Beamer, who is in his 16th season as the Hokies' head coach, was a three-year starter in the secondary for Tech from 1966-68. He is the winningest football coach in school history and is a member of the Tech Sports Hall of Fame. Beamer was the consensus Division I-A Coach of the Year in 1999 when he helped guide Tech to the national championship game.

☛Tech running backs **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) and **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) both rushed for over 150 yards in the Marshall game. Jones compiled 171 yards on 24 carries, while Suggs finished with 153 yards on 24 attempts. It marked just the second time in Tech history that two players had rushed for 150 or more yards in the same game. It was first done by tailbacks Maurice Williams (165) and Eddie Hunter (159) against William & Mary during the 1985 season. Jones and Suggs were just the third set of backs to accomplish the feat in BIG EAST history. Boston College backs Chuckie Dukes (162) and Dwight Shirley (160) did it against Michigan State in 1992. Two other BC backs, Omari Walker (185) and Mike Cloud (159), equalled the feat against Miami in 1997.

☛Tech mounted its longest touchdown drive of the season against Marshall, going 90 yards in nine plays. Tech also had a season-high 15-play drive that took 8:02 off the clock, another season-best.

☛Marshall's 442 yards passing were the most against the Hokies since 1993 when Boston College passed for 448 yards. It was the third-highest overall total ever against a Tech team. The Herd got 233 of their passing yards during the fourth quarter.

**Game 4**

**Hokies End Texas A&M Home Streak With 13-3 Victory**

Sept. 21, 2002 • Kyle Field • Attendance 83,746

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — Virginia Tech snapped Texas A&M's 29-game home winning streak against non-conference teams with a hard-fought 13-3 victory over the 19th-ranked Aggies. Tech became the first non-conference team to win at Kyle Field since Alabama in 1988.

Points and yards were hard to come by in a game that featured two of the nation's best defenses. But the Tech offense, under the direction of sophomore quarterback Bryan Randall, did what it had to do to help secure the Hokies' third straight victory over a Top 20 team. Randall guided Tech on an eight-play, 86-yard touchdown drive early in the fourth quarter that put the Hokies in control. A 52-yard pass from Randall to end Ernest Wilford was the key play, setting up a 1-yard Lee Suggs touchdown run with 12:29 left.

Tech's defense assured the victory by limiting the Aggies' offense to just 58 total yards during its last five possessions. Overall, the Hokies allowed just 156 total yards in the game. Tech forced three turnovers and sacked A&M quarterbacks five times.

Randall, in his first road start, completed 10 of 11 passes for 119 yards and did not throw an interception.

☛The crowd of 83,746 at Texas A&M's Kyle Field was the largest ever to see a Tech team play. The previous high was 80,500 fans at Clemson in 1988.

☛Tech's win at Kyle Field gave the Aggies a rare home loss. It marked just the ninth time Texas A&M has lost to any team at home since the 1988 season.

☛Tech's win against the No. 19 Aggies marked the Hokies' third win against a top 20 team in as many games. The Hokies defeated No. 14 LSU and No. 16 Marshall earlier. That marks the first time in school history Tech has beaten three teams ranked among the top 20 teams in the Associated Press Poll in successive games. The Hokies posted three wins in a row against teams in the AP Top 25 during the 1996 season, downing No. 18 Miami, No. 23 West Virginia and No. 20 Virginia in consecutive games.

☛When Texas A&M kicked a field goal in the first quarter, it marked the first points of the season against Tech in the first half of play. It also marked the first successful field goal of the season against the Hokies. Opposing teams are 1-for-2 on field goals against Tech in 2002.

☛Willie Pile's interception in the Texas A&M game was the 11th of his Tech career. The senior free safety from Alexandria, Va., is now tied for seventh on Tech's career interception list with Mike Johnson, Ashley Lee and William Yarborough.

☛Defensive end Nathaniel Adibi (Hampton, Va.) posted three sacks against Texas A&M. Adibi is the second Tech player to register three sacks in a game this season. End Jim Davis (Highland Springs, Va.) had three against LSU.

**Game 5**

**Tech Overcomes Slow Start to Post Road Win at WMU**

KALAMAZOO, Mich. — A pair of touchdowns in the final two minutes of the first half helped propel No. 5 Virginia Tech to a 30-0 victory at Western Michigan University.

The Hokies led just 3-0 before scoring twice within a 20-second span of the second quarter. A 28-yard shovel pass from quarterback Bryan Randall to tailback Lee Suggs produced Tech's first touchdown with 1:41 remaining in the half. At the 1:21 mark, linebacker Alex Markogiannakis scooped up a WMU fumble and rambled 25 yards for another Tech touchdown to give the Hokies a 16-0 lead at the end of the half.

Tech's defense produced another stellar showing, allowing just 35 yards on the ground and 268 yards overall. Tech defenders forced three fumbles, posted five quarterback sacks and compiled 21 QB hurries.

Randall directed the Hokies on scoring drives of 84 and 77 yards in the second half. He completed 13 of 19 passes for 194 yards during the game and added 40 yards rushing.

☛ Virginia Tech split end **Terrell Parham** (Bartow, Fla.), linebacker **Alex Markogiannakis** (Chantilly, Va.) and flanker **Richard Johnson** (Baltimore, Md.) all made their first collegiate starts against Western Michigan.

☛ When quarterback **Bryan Randall** (Williamsburg, Va.) threw an interception in the first quarter against WMU, it marked the first Tech pass that had been intercepted during the 2002 season.

☛ **Jon Mollerup** (Lyndhurst, Va.) attempted his first varsity field goal and extra point during Tech's win at Western Michigan. Mollerup, who handles the Hokies' kickoffs, was pressed into duty in the first half when starter **Carter Warley** (Richmond, Va.) complained of back pains. Mollerup hit a 37-yard field goal for Tech's first points and made one of two extra point attempts. He missed on a 42-yard field goal try. Warley returned to kick two extra points in the second half.

☛ Senior **Alex Markogiannakis** (Chantilly, Va.) became the 38th different Virginia Tech player to score a defensive touchdown since Frank Beamer took over as the head coach in 1987. Markogiannakis picked up a WMU fumble and returned it 25 yards for his first career touchdown. It was the 47th touchdown scored by the defense under Beamer.

☛ When the Hokies and Broncos played a scoreless first quarter, it marked the first scoreless opening quarter in a Tech game since a 1999 game against West Virginia in Morgantown.

☛ Tech was the highest ranked team (No. 5) to ever play a football game at a Mid-American Conference stadium.

**Game 6**

**Tech Opens BIG EAST Play With Hard-Fought Win at BC**

Oct. 10, 2002 • Alumni Stadium • Attendance 42,826

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. — Virginia Tech used a ball-control offense that ground out 334 yards rushing to open its BIG EAST Conference schedule with a 28-23 victory over Boston College in a Thursday night ESPN game at Alumni Stadium.

Tech put together four long touchdown drives and consumed 37:50 on the clock with an offensive attack that stuck to the ground on 61 of its 68 plays. The Hokies drove 81 and 75 yards for touchdowns in the first half on the way to a 14-7 advantage at the intermission.

Kevin Jones broke a 14-14 tie when he capped a 74-yard Tech drive late in the third quarter with a 4-yard TD run. Lee Suggs put the finishing touches on another 75-yard drive and the win with a 27-yard scoring run with 5:41 left. Quarterback Bryan Randall joined his tailbacks in making key plays as Tech finished with 420 yards of total offense. Randall tossed a 44-yard TD pass to Ernest Wilford and made several key scrambles for first downs.

Tech's defense contributed four sacks, three interceptions and a fumble recovery while holding BC to 83 yards on the ground and 315 yards overall. The Hokies also benefited from a pair of costly personal foul penalties by the Eagles.

**A CLOSER LOOK**

☛ Both **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) and **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) rushed for over 100 yards in the Boston College game. Suggs ran for 154 yards on 26 carries, while Jones posted 144 yards on 18 attempts. That marks the second time this season that Suggs and Jones have both produced over 100-yards on the ground in the same game. The last time Tech had the same two players both rush for 100 yards or more in the same game twice in a season was 1986. That year, tailbacks Maurice Williams and Eddie Hunter accomplished the feat three times, both rushing for over 100 yards in games against Syracuse, Virginia and Richmond. During their Tech careers, Williams and Hunter both gained over 100 yards on the ground in the same game a record four times. They also stand as the only Tech players ever to rush for 100 or more yards in the same bowl game (1986 Peach Bowl). The only other Tech twosome since 1950 to accomplish the feat more than once in the same season was Phil Rogers and James Barber in 1973. Rogers and Barber both ran for over 100 yards in games against Virginia and Florida State.

☛ Virginia Tech's 15 penalties against Boston College were the most during Frank Beamer's 15-plus seasons as head coach. The previous high was 14 against South Carolina in 1988 and Miami in 1993.

☛ **Willie Pile** (Alexandria, Va.) posted his second interception of the season and the 12th of his career during the Hokies' win at Boston College. His pick against the Eagles moves him into a tie for fifth place on both the Tech and BIG EAST career lists for interceptions. Pile is tied with John Granby and Mike Widger on the Tech list. He shares the fifth spot on the BIG EAST list with former Syracuse player, Donovan Darius.

**Hokies Celebrate Homecoming With 35-14 Win Over RU**

Oct. 19, 2002 • Lane Stadium/Worsham Field • Attendance 64,907

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Virginia Tech scored 21 unanswered points in the first quarter to pave the way for a 35-14 Homecoming victory against Rutgers.

Once again, the running of tailbacks Lee Suggs and Kevin Jones highlighted the day for the Hokies, who finished with 342 yards on the ground and 492 yards overall. Suggs led the way with 197 yards and a pair of touchdown runs, while Jones added 132 yards, including a highlight-reel, 58-yard TD scamper. Quarterback Bryan Randall was efficient through the air, completing 11 of 15 passes for 131 yards and a touchdown.

Tech's defense kept the pressure on the Scarlet Knights, registering eight quarterback sacks and two interceptions, while limiting the visitors to minus-seven yards rushing. Rutgers still managed to stay within striking distance until DeAngelo Hall weaved his way 51 yards for a touchdown on a punt return with just under five minutes remaining in the game.

☛ Tech registered a season-high eight sacks against the Scarlet Knights for losses totaling 75 yards. The Hokies' sack total was the highest since posting nine in a 1999 game at Pittsburgh. The sack yardage in the Rutgers' game was the most for Tech during Coach Frank Beamer's 15-plus seasons. The previous high under Beamer was minus-70 yards on seven sacks against Boston College during the 1996 season.

☛ Freshman **Jimmy F. Williams** (Hampton, Va.) recorded his first career interception against RU.

☛ The Rutgers game marked the first time since Sept. 11, 1999 (versus UAB) that a Tech home game was not televised.
