



Wednesday Night Football: Tech Plays Host To WVU

THE SERIES

☛ Wednesday's game will be the 48th football meeting between Virginia Tech and West Virginia University. WVU holds a 26-20-1 advantage in the series, which dates back to 1912. The Hokies won at Morgantown, 35-0, last season and have won 10 of their last 13 games against West Virginia.

Tech has an 11-6-1 record versus WVU in Blacksburg, including a 10-5-1 mark at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. The Mountaineers' last win at Lane Stadium was a 16-7 decision during the 1992 season. Nine of the last 16 Tech-WVU games have been settled by 12 points or less, including six of the last 10 in Blacksburg.

Tech head coach Frank Beamer is 10-5 against West Virginia. WVU's Rich Rodriguez is 0-1 as a head coach against the Hokies.

THE GAME ON TV

☛ The Virginia Tech-WVU game will be televised nationally by ESPN2. Steve Levy will handle the play-by-play with Rod Gilmore serving as the color analyst and Alex Flanagan providing sideline commentary. Tech is 10-2 in games televised by ESPN2, including a 28-21 loss to Pittsburgh this season. Tech and WVU have met twice previously on ESPN2 with Tech winning 35-0 last year at WVU and 31-14 at home in 1996.

- 10 Virginia Tech has won 10 of the 12 games it has played that were televised by ESPN2.
- 9 Tech has played nine football games on Wednesday.
- 8 Ernest Wilford's eight pass receptions against Syracuse were a career high.
- 7 Virginia Tech is currently ranked seventh nationally in passing efficiency.
- 6 Quarterback Bryan Randall accounted for six touchdowns at Syracuse – five passing and one running.
- 5 All five of Tech's touchdown drives during regulation time at Syracuse covered more than 70 yards.
- 4 Defensive end Nathaniel Adibi and linebacker Mikal Baaqee both posted four tackles behind the line against Syracuse.

THIS SEASON

☛ Virginia Tech is 8-2 overall and 3-2 in the BIG EAST Conference after suffering its second straight loss of the season, a 50-42 triple-overtime defeat at Syracuse. Tech opened its season with eight straight wins, including victories against nationally-ranked LSU (14th), Marshall (16th) and Texas A&M (19th). The Hokies' first loss of the year was to Pittsburgh at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

☛ West Virginia stands 7-3 overall on the season and carries a 4-1 record in the BIG EAST Conference. The Mountaineers downed Boston College, 24-14, in their last outing on Nov. 9. WVU is 3-1 on the road with the only loss coming at Wisconsin. Its other losses have been to No. 1 Miami and to Maryland. WVU has league wins against Syracuse, Rutgers, Temple and BC.

COACH FRANK BEAMER

☛ Frank Beamer (Va. Tech '69), whose teams have averaged nine victories a year over the last nine seasons, is in his 16th year as the head football coach at Virginia Tech. Beamer has guided the Hokies to a 115-67-2 record. He became Tech's winningest football coach in 1997 when the Hokies defeated Arkansas State, 50-0.

Under Beamer, Tech football has enjoyed unprecedented success with nine consecutive bowl appearances, three BIG EAST Conference titles and a trip to the national championship game. Last season, the Hokies posted an 8-4 record and appeared in the Top 20 every week despite having to fill four offensive line spots, the quarterback job vacated by sensational underclassman Michael Vick and the tailback spot left open when All-America tailback Lee Suggs was lost for the season with an injury.

During the 2000 season, the Hokies posted an 11-1 record that included a 41-20 win over Clemson in the Gator Bowl. In 1999, Tech marched to an 11-0 regular-season mark before losing a hard-fought 46-29 game to Florida State for the national title in the Sugar Bowl. The Hokies ended that season ranked No. 2 by The Associated Press.

Another highlight of the Hokies' parade of bowl games came when Tech beat Texas, 28-10, in the 1995 Sugar Bowl and finished 10-2. The 1996 Hokies also finished 10-2, bowing to Nebraska, 41-21, in the Orange Bowl. In 1998, Tech registered a 9-3 mark, including a 38-7 win over Alabama in the first Music City Bowl game.

The Hokies posted a record of 7-5 in 1997 after losing to UNC in the Gator Bowl game. The bowl streak started in '93 when Tech beat Indiana in the Independence Bowl, 45-20, to cap a 9-3 season. The Hokies were 8-4 in 1994 after losing to Tennessee, 45-23, in the Gator Bowl.

Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1999 and 1995 and shared it in '96. Beamer was voted BIG EAST Coach of the Year by the league's coaches each of those seasons. In 1997, he was inducted into The Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame, and following the 1999 season, he earned eight national coach of the year honors.

Beamer returned to his alma mater in December 1986 after a six-year stint as the head coach at Murray State University, where he compiled a 42-23-2 mark. His 157-90-4 overall record ranks him sixth among active Division I-A coaches in wins.

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams. The 56-year-old Hillsville, Va., native began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Maryland in 1972. He held assistant coaching positions at The Citadel and Murray State before being named MSU's head coach in 1981.

STABILITY AT THE TOP

☛ One of the keys to the success of Virginia Tech football has been the stability of the program. That stability begins with head coach Frank Beamer.

Beamer, the first Tech alumnus to guide the Hokies' football program since the 1940s, has coached and won more football games at Tech than any other coach. His 15 years at the Hokie helm have helped the program develop a sense of stability and consistency currently enjoyed by just a handful of other Division I-A schools.

Only three of the 117 Division I-A head football coaches have been at their current school longer than Beamer. Those coaches are: Joe Paterno (36 yrs., Penn State); Bobby Bowden (26 yrs., Florida State); and Fisher DeBerry (18 yrs., Air Force).

ACTIVE WINNERS

☛ Frank Beamer is ranked sixth among the winningest active NCAA Division I-A football coaches with 157 career wins. Joe Paterno leads the way with 334 wins followed by Bobby Bowden (330), Lou Holtz (238), Jackie Sherrill (178) and Ken Hatfield (159).

COACH RICH RODRIQUEZ

☛ Rich Rodriquez (WVU '86) is in his second season as the head football coach at West Virginia University, where his record is 10-11. Rodriquez began his coaching career as an assistant at Salem College in 1986. He was named the head coach at Salem in 1988 at the age of 24. He returned to his alma mater, WVU, as a volunteer coach in 1989 and was named the head coach at Glenville State College a year later. Rodriquez guided Glenville State to a 43-28-2 record over seven seasons (1990-96). He was an assistant at Tulane for two seasons and Clemson for two seasons before returning to WVU as the head coach.

TECH IN THE POLLS

☛Virginia Tech is No. 13 in both The Associated Press Poll and the *USA Today*/ESPN Coaches' Poll.

The Hokies posted their highest-ever football rankings during the 1999 and 2000 seasons. Tech finished the 1999 season rated No. 2 by AP and No. 3 by the coaches. In 2000, Tech climbed as high as No. 2 in both polls before finishing No. 6. Prior to the '99 season, Tech's previous high in the AP poll was 10th in the final 1995 poll that followed a 28-10 Sugar Bowl win over Texas. The Hokies had been ranked as high as No. 9 in the coaches' poll. Tech was ranked ninth by the coaches in the final poll of 1995, as well as four times during the '96 season. Tech's highest preseason rankings ever came last season when it was ranked No. 9 in both polls.

Tech has been ranked a total of 131 voting periods by the AP since the beginning of the 1993 season. When Coach Frank Beamer took over in 1987, Tech had been ranked a total of 12 weeks during the first 49 years of the AP poll. The Hokies have been ranked in 76 of the last 77 AP polls including the last 65 in a row.

TECH IN THE BIG EAST

☛Virginia Tech joined the BIG EAST Football Conference as a charter member when the league formed in 1991. Tech has finished among the top four in the league each year since the BIG EAST went to round-robin play in 1993. Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1999 and 1995 and shared the '96 championship with Miami and Syracuse. Tech finished second in 1994, 1997, 2000 and tied for second in 1998. The Hokies were fourth in '93. Last year, Tech tied for third in the league, marking just the second time in the last nine years that it did not finish higher than it was picked. Tech and Miami have won more games (91) than any BIG EAST teams since the start of 1993.

TECH AT HOME

☛Virginia Tech has posted a 143-60-6 overall record in its 37-plus seasons at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. Tech is 69-23-1 at home under the direction of Frank Beamer.

Tech is 29-7 against BIG EAST teams at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. Since losing to Boston College at Lane Stadium in the opening game of the 1995 season, Tech has won 22 of its last 26 home BIG EAST games.

Tech football teams are 302-91-13 in Blacksburg, including a 5-1 record this season.

NIGHT GAMES

☛Since 1946, Virginia Tech football teams have a 64-49-1 mark in night games, including a 31-16-1 record under Coach Frank Beamer. Tech has won 22 of its last 25 regular-season night games. The Hokies have a 14-3 record in night games against BIG EAST opponents. Tech is 2-1 in night games this season.

WEDNESDAY GAMES

☛Virginia Tech has played nine football games on Wednesday, including two bowl games. Tech's last Wednesday game was its 1986 Peach Bowl game against N.C. State. The last regular-season game the Hokies played on a Wednesday was a 1930 home game versus Roanoke College, which Tech won 9-0 at Miles Stadium. Tech is 6-3 overall in games played on Wednesday, including a 4-0 record in Blacksburg.

SCORING STREAK

☛Tech has scored in a school record 92 straight football games, beginning with a 13-7 win over Miami on Sept. 23, 1995. The streak began after a 16-0 loss to Cincinnati in 1995. The previous record was 66 straight games, which started in 1970 and ran into the 1976 season. During their current streak, the Hokies have scored 13 or more points in all but two games.

Last Game

Tech Suffers Three-Overtime Loss At The Carrier Dome

Nov. 9, 2002 • Carrier Dome • Attendance 48,239

SYRACUSE, N.Y. — Damien Rhodes ran for a touchdown and a two-point conversion in the third overtime period to give homestanding Syracuse a wild 50-42 triple-overtime victory over No. 8 Virginia Tech at the Carrier Dome. It was the Hokies' sixth loss in their eight trips to the Dome.

Tech, which got record-setting performances from quarterback Bryan Randall and receiver Ernest Wilford, gave up over 600 yards of offense but still had a number of opportunities to win the game. The Hokies missed field goals at the end of regulation play and at the end of the first overtime period. SU kept its hopes alive with a fourth-down TD pass in the second overtime, then scored and intercepted a Tech pass in the third extra period to end the four-hour game.

ONE FOR THE RECORD BOOK

☛ Virginia Tech's 50-42 triple-overtime loss at Syracuse was the second overtime game in Tech football history. Tech won a 27-20 single-overtime game at Miami in 1998.

☛ **Ernest Wilford** (Richmond, Va.) set Virginia Tech and BIG EAST Conference records for receiving yardage in a game with 279 against SU. Wilford's four touchdown catches also set a Tech mark and tied the conference record. Ricky Scales held the previous Tech record for yardage with 213 against Wake Forest in 1972. Scales and Antonio Freeman shared the old touchdown mark with three. Dietrich Jells of Pittsburgh held the old BIG EAST yardage record with 225 against WVU in 1994. SU receiver David Tyree also surpassed the old mark with 229 yards during the win over Tech. Wilford is tied with Billy Davis of Pittsburgh and Chris Brantley of Rutgers for TD catches in a game.

☛ Quarterback **Bryan Randall** (Williamsburg, Va.) set a BIG EAST record for passing yards in a single game with 504 versus Syracuse. The old conference mark was 485 yards by Miami's Gino Torretta against San Diego State in 1991. Randall's total ranks second at Tech behind Don Strock's 527 yards passing against Houston in 1972. Randall's five passing touchdowns set a new Tech mark for an individual. The old mark of four was set by Strock and equalled by Maurice DeShazo (twice), Michael Vick and Grant Noel. The five TD passes against SU tie a Tech team record. The Hokies had five passing touchdowns against Temple in 1993 — four by DeShazo and one by Jim Druckenmiller.

☛ **Garnell Wilds** (Tampa, Fla.) tied a Tech and BIG EAST record with three interceptions against the Orangemen.

NOTING TECH-WVU

☛Prior to its 35-0 victory at West Virginia last season, Virginia Tech had never scored more than 28 points during a game played in Morgantown. It was West Virginia's worst shutout loss at home in 41 years, dating back to a 45-0 loss to Syracuse in 1960.

☛The shutout against the Mountaineers was Tech's second of the 2001 season against a BIG EAST team. The Hokies eventually posted three BIG EAST shutouts during the season, breaking the league mark of two set by Miami in 1992. Tech went on to lead the nation in shutouts with a total of four.

☛Quarterback **Grant Noel** (Ridgeley, W.Va.) suffered the first interceptions of his career during the WVU game. Noel had thrown 108 consecutive passes without an interception before having one picked off near the end of the first quarter. He fell just short of Michael Vick's school record string of 111 passes without an interception set in 1999.

☛Defensive end **Jim Davis** (Highland Springs, Va.) posted his first pass interception during last year's West Virginia game and returned it 27 yards for his first touchdown. It marked the third-straight game in which the defense contributed a TD. In both 1993 and 1995, Tech scored a defensive touchdown in each of its last two regular-season games and then in a bowl game. Last year, marked the first time under Coach Frank Beamer that Tech scored a defensive TD in three consecutive regular-season games.

☛**Luke Owens** (Grundy, Va.) made his first career start in last year's WVU game. Owens moved into the right guard spot in place of starter **Jake Grove** (Forest, Va.), who was slowed by a broken hand.

Last Season

Tech Defense Stymies West Virginia In 35-0 Road Win

Oct. 6, 2001 • Mountaineer Field • Attendance 63,271

MORGANTOWN, W. Va. — Virginia Tech's defense continued its stellar play as the Hokies blanked BIG EAST rival West Virginia, 35-0, before a sellout crowd at Mountaineer Field. It was the most lopsided win by either team in the series since the very first meeting in 1912 when Tech won 41-0.

The Hokies held the Mountaineers to 174 total yards of offense and never let the home team penetrate closer than the Tech 23-yard line. The defense also contributed a touchdown for the third straight game.

Tailback Keith Burnell posted his first career 100-yard rushing game and scored two touchdowns to lead the offense. Burnell finished with 102 yards on 22 carries, including touchdown runs of 1 and 10 yards. Overall, the Hokies' offense piled up 412 yards, with 224 coming on the ground.

André Davis set up one touchdown with a 53-yard punt return and another with a 39-yard pass reception. Davis finished the game with 206 all-purpose yards.

CALLING THE SIGNALS

☛ Sophomore **Bryan Randall** (Williamsburg, Va.), who saw only limited action as Tech's top backup at quarterback last season, has had a hand in seven wins in 2002, including three over nationally-ranked opponents. Randall came off the bench after the first two series to direct the Tech attack against LSU and made his first collegiate start against Marshall. He completed 10 of 11 passes for 119 yards in his first road game start at Texas A&M.

In his first BIG EAST Conference game at Boston College, Randall threw a 44-yard touchdown pass and scrambled for several key first downs. Against Syracuse, he set a BIG EAST record with 504 yards passing and established a Tech mark with five passing touchdowns. He has connected on 102 of his 158 passing attempts (64.6 percent) for 1,539 yards and 10 touchdowns, while being intercepted nine times. Randall has also contributed 203 yards and three touchdowns on the ground.

NOEL'S KNEE

☛ Quarterback **Grant Noel** (Ridgeley, W.Va.) opened his senior season as Tech's starter despite a torn ACL in his left knee. Noel, who took over the starting duties last season, injured his knee just days before the Hokies' 2002 spring game. Noel opted to forego surgery, which would likely have meant the end of his Tech playing career. Instead, he underwent conservative treatment involving a brace and rehabilitation.

After starting against Arkansas State and LSU, Noel underwent a 15-minute arthroscopic procedure on Sept. 3 to evaluate his left knee. During his procedure, doctors found a partially torn lateral meniscus, which was trimmed up along with the portion of the ACL that was torn during the spring. Noel's only action since has been limited to 12 snaps.

BACKFIELD BACKGROUND

☛ Virginia Tech tailback **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) has scored at least one touchdown in each of the last 23 games in which he has played dating back to the opening game of the 2000 season against Akron. With his 15-yard touchdown reception during the Syracuse game, Suggs tied an NCAA mark for consecutive games with a touchdown. The Tech senior needs a TD against West Virginia to break the 32-year old mark of 23 consecutive games set by Arkansas' Bill Burnett during a span that began on Oct. 5, 1968 through Oct. 31, 1970. Burnett scored a total of 47 touchdowns during that span. Suggs has similar numbers, scoring 48 touchdowns from Sept. 2, 2000 when he scored twice against Akron through Nov. 9, 2002, when he scored against the Orangemen. The fact that Suggs missed all but one game in 2001 does not affect the streak. Also, the NCAA does incorporate bowl games into consecutive game streaks.

☛ **Lee Suggs** currently has 2,463 career yards rushing on 467 carries, an average of 5.3 yards per attempt. Runningmate **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) has rushed for 1,665 yards on 296 carries, an average of 5.6 yards per carry. The most productive Tech twosome in terms of career rushing yardage has been tailbacks Maurice Williams (2,981) and Eddie Hunter (2,523) who combined for 5,504 yards from 1983 through 1986. To date, the closest two Tech backs have come to both gaining 1,000 yards on the ground in the same season was in 1973 when Phil Rogers rushed for 1,036 yards and James Barber added 927 yards. Their combined 1,963 yards stand as a season record for two Tech players. Suggs and Jones have a combined total of 1,729 yards rushing this season. Suggs has already surpassed the 1,000-yard mark for the year with 1,021 yards, while Jones stands at 708 yards after missing the Hokies' last seven quarters of play with an ankle injury. Suggs joins Cyrus Lawrence and Roscoe Coles as the only Tech players to post 1,000-yard rushing seasons twice during their Tech careers. Suggs rushed for 1,207 yards during the the 2000 season.

☛ **Lee Suggs** became the BIG EAST Conference's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns when he scored the first of his two touchdowns at Boston College. Suggs, who now has 45 career rushing touchdowns, passed former West Virginia standout Amos Zereoue who held the old mark of 38. Just one game earlier, Suggs became the BIG EAST's career leader in total touchdowns when he scored two TDs against Western Michigan. Suggs, who now has 48 career touchdowns (45 rushing, three receiving), broke the conference mark of 39 that was shared by William Green of Boston College and Zereoue. The Tech senior has scored at least one touchdown in each of the last 23 games in which he has played (all as a starter), including the 2001 Gator Bowl game. Suggs led the nation in scoring in 2000 when he scored 28 touchdowns. His current point total of 288 places him fourth on the BIG EAST's list of career scoring leaders. Suggs needs two points to move by WVU's Jay Taylor who is third on the list with 289 points. Tech's Shayne Graham is the league's all-time scoring leader with 371 points.

LEE AND KJ

☛ Virginia Tech's tailback duo of senior **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) and sophomore **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) was ranked among the nation's best backfield combinations by many preseason publications, and they have lived up to their billing. During the Hokies' 10 games of the 2002 season, Suggs and Jones have rushed for 1,729 yards and scored a total of 25 touchdowns. Together, they are averaging 172.9 yards rushing per game and 5.6 yards per carry. Suggs has 189 carries for 1,021 yards so far this season and has scored 16 TDs. Jones has 121 carries for 708 yards and has nine touchdowns.

☛ **Lee Suggs** has regained the form that helped him earn All-America honors in 2000. He has been a consistent performer throughout the Hokies' 2002 season. He rushed for 91 yards and two touchdowns on 22 carries in the LSU game and had 24 carries for 153 yards and two TDs versus Marshall. Suggs ran for 154 yards and two TDs at Boston College before gaining a career-high 197 yards on the ground against Rutgers. He added 128 yards against Pittsburgh.

Suggs was lost to the Virginia Tech football team for the 2001 season after suffering a torn ACL in his left knee during the Hokies' 52-10 win over Connecticut. Suggs rushed for 99 yards and two touchdowns on 12 carries before injuring his knee in the third quarter.

Suggs made quite an impact in 2000, his first year as a starter. He finished first in the Division I-A ranks in scoring (15.27 ppg) and touchdowns (28) and led the BIG EAST Conference in both scoring and rushing (109.1 ypg).

Suggs' final rushing tally of 1,207 yards was the third-best single-season mark in school history and the best during coach Frank Beamer's 15 seasons. He tied a school season mark with six 100-yard games.

Suggs scored five TDs at UCF, and four versus both Rutgers and Virginia in 2000. He carried the football a total of 222 times without a fumble and was named third-team All-America by The Associated Press.

With his two touchdowns in the UConn game, Suggs established new Tech career records for both rushing touchdowns and total TDs. He currently ranks second on Tech's career scoring list with 288 points. Tech's all-time scoring leader is place-kicker Shayne Graham with 371 points.

Suggs' career rushing total of 2,463 yards ranks seventh at Tech. He needs 61 yards to move by Eddie Hunter for sixth on the list.

☛ Highly-touted **Kevin Jones** lived up to his billing during his first season with the Hokies, earning 2001 BIG EAST Rookie of the Year honors. The true freshman running back became a prominent figure in the Tech offense after Lee Suggs suffered a season-ending knee injury in the opening game.

Jones ended up in the starting lineup for the Hokies' last three regular-season games and the Gator Bowl. During the final three regular-season games, Jones contributed 155 yards rushing at Temple, 181 yards against Virginia and 160 yards versus No. 1 Miami. His 957 yards for the season led the team and set a school season mark for a freshman. He ranked fifth among Division I-A freshmen in rushing yards for the season and third among true freshmen. He was named a freshman All-American by *The Sporting News*.

This season, Jones has rushed for 70 yards and a TD against LSU and carried 24 times for 171 yards and three TDs versus Marshall. He scored another touchdown at WMU and added 144 yards rushing and a TD against Boston College. In Tech's win over Rutgers, he registered 132 yards on the ground and scored on a 58-yard run.

WHAT'S A HOKIE?

That's the most often-asked question in Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute. With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today. Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics. Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

BEAMERBALL

☛During the Frank Beamer era at Tech, putting points on the scoreboard has always been a team effort — the offensive team, the defensive team and the special teams. It's called BeamerBall, and what sets it apart are the contributions of the defense and special teams.

Each of Tech's last eight teams is ranked among the school's top 10 highest scoring teams. During that time, a player at every position on the defensive unit has produced at least one touchdown. And 21 different players have scored touchdowns while playing on Tech's special teams. Altogether, the defense and special teams have combined for 75 TDs since Beamer arrived in 1987, including 58 in Tech's last 108 games.

Under Beamer, Tech's defense has scored 47 TDs, with 27 coming on pass interceptions, 18 on fumble returns and two on fumble recoveries. The special teams have added 28 TDs, including 13 on blocked punts, nine on punt returns, three on kickoff returns, two on blocked field goals and one on a fumble recovery.

Fittingly, the trend started in Beamer's first game as Tech's head coach when true freshman Jon Jeffries returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Clemson. It was the Hokies' first touchdown under Beamer, and it was scored on special teams.

Under Beamer, a total of 55 different players on Tech's defense and special teams have scored touchdowns. Twelve of those players — Don Stokes, Jock Jones, Roger Brown, Lawrence Lewis, Antonio Banks, Jim Baron, Keion Carpenter, Pierson Prioleau, Anthony Midget, Cory Bird and Kevin McCadam — scored twice. **DeAngelo Hall**, Ike Charlton and Ricky Hall have three scores and André Davis four.

Since the start of the 1993 season, Tech is 39-5 in games it scores at least one TD on defense or special teams.

BEAMERBALL II

☛ Virginia Tech's tradition for blocking kicks is another part of BeamerBall. It was carried to new heights in 1998 with 10 blocks during the regular season and two more in the Hokies' Music City Bowl game against Alabama. Tech now has 95 blocks in Beamer's 184 games as the head coach. The Hokies have blocked 49 punts (13 for TDs), 25 field goals and 21 extra points.

☛ Tech blocked more kicks in the 1990s than any other Division I-A team. The Hokies blocked 63 kicks during the decade — 31 punts, 18 PATs and 14 FGs. Tech has started the new decade with 19 blocks.

☛ The most prolific kick blockers under Beamer have been defensive lineman Bernard Basham and safety Keion Carpenter who each posted six blocks during their Tech careers. Basham blocked three field goals and three PATs, while Carpenter blocked six punts.

☛ The teams Tech has victimized the most during Frank Beamer's 16-seasons have been Pittsburgh, WVU and Miami. During that span, the Hokies have blocked 10 kicks versus the Panthers and eight against the Mountaineers and 'Canes.

☛ Since joining the BIG EAST Conference in 1991, the Hokies have posted at least three blocked kicks against every team in the league. During that span, Tech has blocked 10 kicks against Pittsburgh, eight versus Miami, six against WVU, five versus Rutgers, four against BC and three against Syracuse and Temple.

☛ During the Beamer era, Tech has blocked two kicks in a game 17 times, including two against No. 14 LSU this season. Tech blocked two kicks against four different teams in 1998.

CRAWFORD UPDATE

☛Tech starting rover **Michael Crawford** (Baltimore, Md.) underwent an open biopsy on Nov. 11 at Montgomery Regional Hospital to test for possible lymphoma. The redshirt junior underwent a needle biopsy prior to Tech's game with Pittsburgh, then traveled to Baltimore for further tests the following week. Both tests revealed the suspicion of lymphoma.

Crawford is not undergoing any treatment at this time and could play against West Virginia if the sutures from the open biopsy heal in time. Once the results of the recent tests are known, a method of treatment will be determined.

Crawford got the starting nod at rover prior to the 2002 opener. He turned in his best game at Texas A&M with five tackles, a tackle for loss, a sack, a fumble caused and a pass broken up. He has 40 tackles and two sacks for the year.

Billy Hardee (Winter Haven, Fla.) started the Syracuse game and was in on 12 tackles. Hardee, who has pushed Crawford for the starting duties, has 37 tackles for the season.

WHIP LB

☛Redshirt sophomore **Brandon Manning** (Harrisburg, Pa.) has started nine of Tech's 10 games this season at whip linebacker. Manning is another successful product of the Hokies' walk-on program, having already earned a scholarship and a starting position. Manning is currently third on the team in tackles with 60. He has four tackles for loss, including one quarterback sack. Manning has also broken up two passes and recovered a fumble.

Mike Daniels (Fairfax, Va.), who started the final four games of the 2001 season at whip linebacker, has kept the pressure on Manning for the starting job. Daniels has one start this season and has contributed 37 tackles, including two for losses.

VEGAS

☛Starting inside linebacker **Vegas Robinson** (Chesapeake, Va.) is hoping to return to action against WVU after missing three games due to an ankle injury. Robinson, who took over the backer spot vacated by Ben Taylor has been a key player in the Hokies' defense.

Robinson, who saw action on just 78 defensive plays last year, has been in on 336 plays this season. Despite missing time, he still ranks seventh in tackles with 42 and has two pass interceptions, two tackles for loss, two fumble recoveries and a pair of quarterback hurries.

SECONDARY EXPERIENCE

☛Virginia Tech's defensive secondary features an experienced cast of performers led by senior returning starters **Ronyell Whitaker** (Norfolk, Va.) and **Willie Pile** (Alexandria, Va.) and dynamic sophomore **DeAngelo Hall** (Chesapeake, Va.).

Prior to the season, the Tech secondary was rated among the nation's best by several preseason magazines, but the loss of versatile junior **Eric Green** (Clewiston, Fla.) with a season-ending knee injury and the suspension of Whitaker for two games forced the Hokies to shuffle their lineup. During Whitaker's absence, secondary coach Lorenzo Ward started promising sophomore free safety **Vincent Fuller** (Baltimore, Md.) at the field corner spot were Whitaker and Green were both working. Fuller and experienced redshirt junior **Garnell Wilds** (Tampa, Fla.) combined to solidify the position. Fuller has been outstanding with 22 tackles, six pass breakups and four interceptions. Wilds has 36 tackles, five breakups three interceptions and a key fumble recovery. Whitaker, who has 26 tackles, returned to the starting lineup against Marshall, but Fuller continues to see significant playing time.

Pile, who is in his third season as a starter, has been rated as one of the top free safeties in Division I-A for the second straight year. He is second on the team with 67 tackles and has three interceptions. Pile also has five pass breakups.

Hall, the starting boundary corner, was listed as the best athlete in the BIG EAST by *Street & Smith's* preseason magazine and showed why by returning a punt and an interception for touchdowns in Tech's opening game. Hall led the cornerbacks with 35 tackles before being sidelined indefinitely with back pain. He leads the team in pass breakups with nine and is tied for the lead in interceptions with four.

DON'T FORGET THESE GUYS

☛Virginia Tech's tailbacks and defensive backfield have been rated among the best units in the nation, but it's hard to overlook the Hokies' defensive ends.

This year's group of ends ranks with the best Tech has had. The veteran group includes redshirt junior **Nathaniel Adibi** (Hampton, Va.), who has played in 34 games, 30 as a starter; senior **Lamar Cobb** (Hurt, Va.), who has played in 37 games, 20 as a starter; redshirt junior **Cols Colas** (Plantation, Fla.), who has played in 32 games, 10 as a starter; and junior **Jim Davis** (Highland Springs, Va.), who has played in 31 games, eight as a starter.

Last season, those four players combined for 49 quarterback hurries and 11 of the Hokies' 30 sacks. This season, they have produced 53 hurries and 21.5 sacks in 10 games.

Davis is a play-maker who is trying to shake a nagging ankle injury. Last year, he tied for the team lead in sacks with 4.5, intercepted a pass and returned it for a touchdown and forced two fumbles that were returned for TDs. He has 28 tackles, 5.5 sacks, seven total tackles for loss, nine hurries and three passes batted down so far in 2002.

Adibi has been one of the standouts on this year's young defense. He has already surpassed his career high with nine sacks. He has 40 tackles, 13 hurries and has forced three fumbles, one of which was returned for a TD. During the Syracuse game he had a career-high 13 tackles, two sacks and two other tackles behind the line.

Colas' power and explosive speed – 390 bench press and 4.41 forty – make him hard to handle on the corner. He has 20 hurries, six sacks and 13 total tackles for loss to go with 37 tackles. He was in on 11 tackles at SU.

Cobb led the ends in tackles last year with 46. He currently has 11 hurries, a sack and 25 tackles.

ON THE RECEIVING END

☛A lot of attention was paid to the receiving positions during the spring and preseason as Tech looked to replace veteran wideouts André Davis and Emmett Johnson.

A variety of players have seen action in Tech's first 10 games with redshirt junior **Ernest Wilford** (Richmond, Va.) and seniors **Shawn Witten** (Elizabethton, Tenn.) and **Terrell Parham** (Bartow, Fla.) leading the way. Wilford has been outstanding with 33 catches for 716 yards and six touchdowns. He is averaging 21.7 yards per catch, tops among the leading receivers in the BIG EAST. Wilford ranks second in the conference in receiving yards per game with 71.6.

Witten is second on the team with 16 catches for 192 yards, while Parham is third with 14 for 121 yards. **Richard Johnson** (r-So.; Baltimore, Md.) got his first start as a Hokie at Western Michigan and has posted a total of 10 catches for 91 yards. **Justin Hamilton** (Clintwood, Va.), a redshirt freshman who was moved from tailback during the spring, has four catches for 49 yards.

CLEARING THE WAY

☛Leading the charge for Tech's highly-touted running backs is an offensive line that ranks among the largest in school history. The unit is anchored by 6-3, 292-pound **Jake Grove** (r-Jr.; Forest, Va.) who moved to center this year after starting every game at guard in 2001. Grove has been outstanding, earning a spot in the Winner's Circle every game and leading the team with a total of 34 knockdown blocks.

Also back from last year's starting lineup are 6-4, 322-pound left tackle **Anthony Davis** (Victoria, Va.) and 6-3, 310-pound right guard **Luke Owens** (Grundy, Va.). Davis, has 31 knockdowns, while Owens has 23.

Jon Dunn (r-So.; Virginia Beach, Va.), a 6-7, 319-pounder, and **Jimmy Martin** (Fr.; Fairfax, Va.) have been manning the right tackle position. Six-four, 302-pound **Jacob Gibson** (r-Jr.; Rocky Mount, Va.) and 6-6, 304-pound **James Miller** (So.; Pompano Beach, Fla.) have both gotten starts at left guard. Gibson, who has eight starts, is second on the team with 32 knockdowns.

FRESH FACES

☞ Twelve true freshmen have dressed for the Hokies this season. True freshmen who dress on offense are tackles **Reggie Butler** (Keswick, Va.) and **Jimmy Martin** (Fairfax, Va.), center **Danny McGrath** (Herndon, Va.), tailback **Mike Imoh** (Fairfax, Va.), quarterback **Marcus Vick** (Newport News, Va.) and tailback **John Candelas** (Blacksburg, Va.). The true freshmen on defense who are dressing are end **Darryl Tapp** (Chesapeake, Va.), tackle **Jonathan Lewis** (Richmond, Va.), cornerback **Cary Wade** (Fairfax, Va.) and safety **Jimmy F. Williams** (Hampton, Va.). Kickers **Nic Schmitt** (Salem, Va.) and **Brandon Pace** (Virginia Beach, Va.) round out the group. All but Vick and Pace have played.

☞ The busiest of the true freshmen are defensive tackle **Jonathan Lewis** and defensive end **Darryl Tapp**. Lewis has been in on 254 plays at tackle and 33 on special teams. Tapp, who is a starter on five different special teams, has played 232 plays on special teams and 89 snaps at end.

THE OTHER BACKS

☞ While tailbacks **Lee Suggs** and **Kevin Jones** are stealing all the headlines, **Doug Easlick** (r-Jr.; Marlton, N.J.), **Cedric Humes** (r-Fr.; Virginia Beach, Va.) and **Josh Spence** (r-So.; Riner, Va.) are quietly handling the fullback duties.

All three have seen action with Easlick getting the starting nod in all 10 games. Easlick has rushed 13 times for 54 yards and caught 10 passes for 73 yards and one TD. Humes, who worked some at both fullback and tailback during the Arkansas State game, has rushed for 68 yards on 16 carries. He also has five pass receptions for 43 yards. Spence has also seen action, rushing four times for 26 yards and catching a pass for an 18-yard gain.

BIG EAST HONORS

☞ Senior free safety **Willie Pile** (Alexandria, Va.) was named the BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Week following Tech's win at Texas A&M. Pile led the Hokies with 10 tackles, including five solo hits. He also intercepted a pass and returned it 17 yards to set up Tech's go-ahead field goal. Pile added a fumble recovery that he returned 31 yards.

☞ Sophomore tailback **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) was named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week for his showing against No. 16 Marshall. Jones carried 24 times for 171 yards and three touchdowns in Tech's 47-21 win. Two of his TDs came in the first half to help the Hokies build a 20-0 lead.

☞ **Mikal Baaqee** (Columbia, Md.) was named BIG EAST Co-Defensive Player of the Week after the Hokies' win against Marshall. The redshirt sophomore linebacker set up Tech's second touchdown with an interception. He also contributed three solo tackles, six assists and a pass broken up.

☞ Junior defensive end **Jim Davis** (Highland Springs, Va.) was named BIG EAST Co-Defensive Player of the Week after posting six tackles, three sacks and two hurries against LSU. Davis was the first Tech player to have three sacks in a game since 1999 when rover Cory Bird had three versus Boston College.

☞ Punter **Vinnie Burns** (New Orleans, La.) enjoyed his best career punting day as a Hokie against a team from his home state. Burns was named the BIG EAST Special Teams Player of the Week after averaging a personal-best 44.7 yards per punt against LSU. Four of Burns' nine punts covered 50 yards or more and four were placed inside the Tigers' 20-yard line.

☞ Tailback **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) earned BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week honors after rushing for a career-high 197 yards in a win over Rutgers. Suggs averaged 9.4 yards on 21 carries and scored two touchdowns on runs of 3 and 42 yards.

☞ Sophomore **DeAngelo Hall** (Chesapeake, Va.) was named BIG EAST Co-Special Teams Player of the Week for his performance as a punt returner against Rutgers. Hall had five returns for 74 yards. He iced the win with a 51-yard return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter.

☞ Split end **Ernest Wilford** (Richmond, Va.) was named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week after turning in the most proficient receiving day in league history. The redshirt junior had a conference and school-record 279 receiving yards against Syracuse on a career-high eight catches. He set a Tech record and tied a league mark with four TD receptions.

TWO-MINUTE DRILL

☞ The Tech-West Virginia game matches the Hokies' BIG EAST leading rushing defense (80.2 ypg) against WVU's league leading rushing offense (294.9). It also pits Tech's No. 2 ranked rushing offense (216.6) against West Virginia's No. 2 rated rushing defense (95.1).

☞ West Virginia and Virginia Tech are one-two, respectively, in time of possession among BIG EAST schools.

☞ Tech has lost back-to-back games that it led at halftime for the first time since 1990 when it lost to South Carolina and FSU.

☞ Forty-eight of the last 53 passes caught by Virginia Tech tight ends have produced first downs.

☛ Syracuse's 604 yards of offense was the highest total against the Hokies since Boston College posted 617 yards against Tech in 1993.

☛ **Bryan Randall's** 35 passing attempts and 23 completions against Syracuse were the most for a Tech quarterback since 1996 when Jim Druckenmiller hit 24 of 37 passes against Rutgers.

☛ Syracuse's 100 offensive plays against Tech set a BIG EAST single-game record and equalled the highest total against Tech set by both Ohio University and William & Mary in 1971.

☛ During the Syracuse game, **Keith Willis** (Norfolk, Va.) had 113 yards receiving to become the first Tech tight end to reach the 100-yard mark in a game since Mike Shaw had 120 yards versus VMI in 1982.

☛ Tech's 65-consecutive appearances in the AP Poll represent the second-longest active streak behind Michigan, which has been ranked 75 consecutive weeks. Miami is third on the list at 50 straight weeks, while Oklahoma (45) and Texas (38) stand fourth and fifth.

☛ **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) is the first Tech tailback to catch two TD passes in a season since Vaughn Hebron caught four in 1990.

☛ Since the start of BIG EAST Conference round-robin play in 1993, Tech is 63-3 when it rushes for 200 yards or more.

☛ Tech's top tackler on special teams has been redshirt freshman **Jordan Trott** (Torrance, Calif.) with a total of 10 tackles. **Kevin Jones** (So.; Chester, Pa.), **Garnell Wilds** (r-Jr.; Tampa, Fla.) and **Darryl Tapp** (Fr.; Chesapeake, Va.) are second with eight tackles each.

Extra Points

☛ The Rutgers' game marked the third time this season that both **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) and **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) broke the 100-yard rushing barrier in the same game. The only other time on record that feat has been accomplished in a single season was in 1986 when tailbacks Maurice Williams and Eddie Hunter both rushed for over 100 yards in games against Syracuse, Virginia and Richmond. During their Tech careers (1983-86), Williams and Hunter both gained over 100 yards in the same regular-season games four times. They also stand as the only Tech players ever to rush for over 100 yards in the same bowl game (1986 Peach Bowl). The only other Tech twosome since 1950 to accomplish the feat more than once in the same season was Phil Rogers and James Barber during the 1973 season. That year, Rogers and Barber both ran for over 100 yards in games against Virginia and Florida State. Suggs and Jones both topped the 100-yard mark against Boston College and Rutgers. The only other time since 1950 that the Hokies have had two players rush for 100 yards or more in the same game in back-to-back outings was in 1979. During that season, tailback Kenny Lewis and fullback Mickey Fitzgerald both surpassed 100 yards against Appalachian State, then the following game, Lewis and fellow tailback Cyrus Lawrence did it against William & Mary. Prior to 2002, Tech had not had the same two players accomplish the feat in consecutive games during the modern era.

☛ Tech has allowed just 36 points in the first half of play this season. The Hokies have outscored their opponents 189-36 in the first half, including a 115-13 advantage in the first quarter. Since the beginning of the 1993 season, Tech has posted a 75-7 record in games when it is leading at the half. During that same stretch, the Hokies are 7-0 in games when the score is tied at the half and 9-20 in contests when they have trailed at the half.

☛ During the Syracuse game, split end **Ernest Wilford** (Richmond, Va.) and tight end **Keith Willis** (Norfolk, Va.) both hauled in 87-yard pass receptions. Their catches stand as the third-longest in Tech history. Willis' catch was the longest ever for a Tech tight end.

☛ Free safety **Willie Pile** (Alexandria, Va.) was named the Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week for his performance in Tech's 13-3 victory at Texas A&M. Pile had 10 tackles in the game, including five solo hits. He also contributed an interception and a fumble recovery. Pile returned the interception 17 yards and advanced the fumble 31 yards. Pile has been added to the watch list for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, which will be presented on Dec. 9.

☛ Former high school teammates **Jason Lallis** (Mitchellville, Md.) and **Mikal Baaqee** (Columbia, Md.) made their first Tech starts in the same game. Lallis opened at tackle and Baaqee at mike linebacker against Arkansas State. The two players entered Tech together after starring at DeMatha High School.

MORE ON TECH-WVU

☞ In an amazing span of 6:06 of the third quarter against West Virginia in 2000, Tech flanker André Davis scored three touchdowns in three different ways on three consecutive Tech possessions. Davis started by taking a reverse 30 yards for a touchdown that put the Hokies ahead 20-14 with 8:30 showing in the third quarter. On Tech's next offensive play after forcing a West Virginia punt, Davis hauled in a 64-yard pass from Michael Vick for another TD with 4:20 left in the quarter. When WVU was forced to punt again on its next possession, Davis received the punt, took advantage of a crushing block by Wayne Ward and raced 76 yards for his third straight touchdown. His final score came with 2:24 remaining in the quarter.

Davis became the first Tech player to score touchdowns three different ways in a game since the Hokies' modern-day records started in 1950. He also became the first Tech player to score three touchdowns in a single quarter since 1978 when tailback Kenny Lewis scored three first-quarter TDs in a season-opening loss to Tulsa. The last Tech player to score three consecutive touchdowns in a game without any other scores in between was tailback Maurice Williams against Louisville during the 1985 season.

☞ Tech scored 41 second-half points during its win over WVU in 2000. That stands as the most points scored by the Hokies in the second half of a game since Tech's modern-day records began in 1950. Tech scored an overall record 61 points during the second half of a 99-0 win against Emory & Henry in 1919.

☞ Bob Slowikowski hauled in a 72-yard TD pass in the 2000 game, which at the time was the longest ever for a Tech tight end.

☞ When Tech failed to score in the second quarter of its 48-20 victory against West Virginia in 2000, it ended a streak that had seen the Hokies score in every quarter during the 2000 season. Tech opened the season by scoring in a school-record 21 consecutive quarters.

☞ Virginia Tech's last-second 22-20 win at West Virginia in 1999 on a 44-yard Shayne Graham field goal marked the Hokies' first win on the last play of the game in Frank Beamer's tenure at Tech. The last time Tech won on the last play was in the 1986 Peach Bowl when kicker Chris Kinzer booted a 40-yard field goal to give the Hokies a 25-24 victory over North Carolina State. Ironically, both Kinzer and Graham played high school football at Pulaski County (Va.) High School.

☞ When West Virginia scored two touchdowns late in the final quarter of the 1999 game to take a 20-19 lead, it marked the first time all season that Tech had trailed in a game.

☞ Tech failed to score in the first quarter of play against WVU in '99, breaking a string of 16 consecutive games in which it had scored points in the first quarter of play.

☞ The Tech offense registered over 400 yards of offense for the fifth straight game, but scored a season-low 22 points. The game ended the Hokies' school-record string of 10 consecutive games with 30 or more points.

☞ Tailback André Kendrick turned in a 46-yard touchdown run for Tech's first score in the 1999 game at West Virginia. The run was the longest of the season against the Mountaineers. Quarterback Michael Vick's 305 yards of total offense in the win where the most by a player against WVU during the '99 season.

☞ Tech registered its second safety of the year during the WVU game. The Hokies' other safety came against JMU. Prior to that, the last time Tech had two safeties in a season was 1966.

☞ Tech blocked two kicks during the first quarter of its 1998 game with West Virginia on the way to a new season mark for blocks during Coach Frank Beamer's tenure as coach. Marcus Gildersleeve blocked a WVU punt that was returned for a touchdown by teammate Ricky Hall and John Engelberger blocked an extra point. The previous high for blocks during Beamer's 11-plus seasons was eight in 1995. Tech went on to block 10 kicks during its regular-season games in '98 and added two more blocks in a 38-7 win over Alabama in the inaugural Music City Bowl game.

☞ Tech intercepted passes on four consecutive WVU possessions in the second half of their 1998 meeting. Each of the first three picks were by cornerback Ike Charlton. The last was by linebacker Michael Hawkes.

☞ Tech held West Virginia to its lowest point total of the 1998 season (13). The Mountaineers had 28 points or more in 10 of their 12 games during the '98 season and scored more than 30 points nine times.

☞ During the 1998 game with West Virginia, Tech failed to score at least one rushing touchdown for the only time all year. The Hokies' touchdowns against the Mountaineers came on a blocked punt and a pair of passes.

☞ West Virginia's 24 points in the second quarter of the 1997 game still stand as the most points against Tech in a quarter since the 1988 season opener when Clemson scored 24 points in the second period of a 40-7 win over Tech at Death Valley.

☛ West Virginia's 27 points in '97 still stand as the most points against Tech in the first half of a regular-season game since Boston College scored 28 in 1993.

☛ Jimmy Kibble's 29-yard run on a fake punt against WVU in 1997 stood as the longest gain for a Tech player on a fake punt at that time since 1988. Last season against UCF, the Hokies' completed a 33-yard pass on a fake punt. In '88, linebacker Randy Cockrell ran 37 yards on a fake punt versus Virginia.

☛ Tech's 365 yards of total offense were the most allowed by West Virginia's top-ranked defensive unit during the 1996 season, including its Gator Bowl meeting with UNC.

☛ When West Virginia's Chad Johnston hit David Saunders on a 1-yard touchdown pass at Tech in 1996, it marked WVU's first TD pass against the Hokies during the 1990s. The Mountaineers finished with just six touchdown passes against the Hokies during the entire decade.

☛ Tech's 27-0 victory at West Virginia in 1995 marked the Hokies' first-ever shutout in a BIG EAST Conference game.

☛ The Hokies lost at WVU, 14-13, during the 1993 season despite forcing five turnovers and not committing any turnovers of their own. Tech ran just 17 offensive plays during the second half of that game.

☛ Tech's first-ever BIG EAST Football Conference game was a 20-14 win at WVU in 1991. The Hokies' first-ever BIG EAST home game was a 16-7 loss to WVU in 1992. Both games were played before the conference went to round-robin competition in 1993.

☛ The team with the most rushing yards has won all but two of the 15 Tech-WVU games played during Frank Beamer's tenure as the Hokies' head coach. Tech won 20-14 in 1991 despite being outgained on the ground 217 yards to 170. In 1998, the Hokies were outrushed 147 yards to 110, but won 27-13.

FAMILY TIES

☛ Brothers **Kevin** and **Jonathan Lewis** (Richmond, Va.) played side-by-side at defensive tackle for the first time at Tech during the Arkansas State game. Kevin, a redshirt sophomore starter, and Jonathan, a true freshman, are the first brothers to play side-by-side at Tech since offensive linemen T.J. and Todd Washington in 1995 and 1996. The Lewis brothers have combined for 81 tackles, 11 quarterback hurries, 11 tackles for losses and three sacks.

OPEN DATES

☛ November 16 marks the 31st open date for Tech since the start of the 1970 season. The Hokies are 17-13 in games following those open dates, including a 16-9 mark under Coach Frank Beamer. Earlier this season, Tech defeated Marshall at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field after an open date and Boston College at Chestnut Hill following an open Saturday.

YOUTH MOVEMENT

☛ Of the 76 Virginia Tech players who have seen playing time so far this season, 44 are freshmen or sophomores. The overall breakdown is 10 true freshmen, 14 redshirt freshmen, 20 sophomores, 19 juniors and 13 seniors. A total of 18 players have made their first collegiate starts this season on offense and defense.

☛ Only one of the 13 players who have recorded sacks for Tech this season is a senior. Senior end **Lamar Cobb** (Hurt, Va.) has one sack.

THE NUMBERS GAME

YOUNG TACKLES

☛Of the 11 players who got some work at defensive tackle during the preseason, seven were true freshmen or redshirt freshmen. Only three of the players had seen any varsity action at the position. **Kevin Lewis** (Richmond, Va.) and **Jason Lallis** (r-So.; Mitchellville, Md.) had only limited experience before earning the starting jobs in 2002. Lewis saw action on 125 plays as a freshman in 2000, then was redshirted last year, while Lallis was primarily an end until playing a few downs at tackle late last season. Lewis and Lallis currently rank fourth and fifth, respectively, on the team in tackles. Lewis has 47 tackles, a sack and six hurries. Lallis has 46 tackles, two sacks, seven hurries and a blocked kick. He also returned a fumble caused by Lewis 59 yards for a TD. Lewis' younger brother Jonathan, a true freshman, has 34 tackles and two sacks.

ROAD WORK

☛Virginia Tech's win at Texas A&M was the first by a non-conference team at A&M's Kyle Field during Aggie coach R.C. Slocum's 13-plus seasons at the helm. Texas A&M had posted 29 consecutive victories against non-conference teams in College Station under Slocum. The last non-league team to win at Kyle Stadium was Alabama in 1988.

☛Virginia Tech's three-game road sweep of No. 19 Texas A&M, Western Michigan and Boston College marked just the second time in school history that a Tech football team won three consecutive games played on opposing teams' home fields during a single season. The only other Tech team to accomplish the feat was the 1955 team that won successive road games at Pennsylvania (33-0), William & Mary (14-7) and Florida State (24-20).

A CLOSER LOOK

☛Virginia Tech's 56 points in the first half against Arkansas State marked the most points in a half for a Tech squad during the modern era (since 1950). It also ranked as the second-highest point total in a half by a BIG EAST Conference team behind the 59 points scored by West Virginia against Rutgers last season. The Hokies' 35 first-quarter points against the Indians tied modern day school and BIG EAST Conference marks for points in a quarter.

☛Tech's 63 points in the ASU game were the most points scored by the Hokies in a season opening game since Tech defeated Roanoke College 86-0 to open the 1905 season. The last time Tech scored more points in a game was a 77-27 win over Akron in 1995.

☛Each of the Hokies' first four touchdowns against ASU were scored in a different manner. Tech scored on a punt return, a rushing play, an interception and a pass play. The Hokies also had a fumble return for a TD later in the game. Special teams, offense and defense each contributed one of Tech's first three scores.

☛Eleven Tech players made their first collegiate starts in the Arkansas State game. The first-time starters on offense were guard **James Miller** (Pompano Beach, Fla.), tackle **Jon Dunn** (Virginia Beach, Va.), tight end **Keith Willis** (Norfolk, Va.) and fullback **Doug Easlick** (Marlton, N.J.). Starting for the first time on defense were tackles **Kevin Lewis** (Richmond, Va.) and **Jason Lallis** (Mitchellville, Md.), linebackers **Brandon Manning** (Harrisburg, Pa.), **Vegas Robinson** (Chesapeake, Va.) and **Mikal Baaqee** (Columbia, Md.), rover **Michael Crawford** (Baltimore, Md.) and cornerback **Vincent Fuller** (Baltimore, Md.).

Game 2
Hokies Post Victory Over Defending SEC Champs LSU

Sept. 1, 2002 • Lane Stadium/Worsham Field • Attendance 65,049

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Sixteenth-ranked Virginia Tech used a strong defense and an opportunistic offense to defeat No. 14 Louisiana State, 26-8, in front of a state-record crowd of 65,049 at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Tech capitalized on good field position to build a 14-0 advantage in the first half. A 17-yard punt return by sophomore DeAngelo Hall put the Hokies at the LSU 27 late in the first quarter. From there, it took Tech just six plays to score its first touchdown. A blocked punt gave the Hokies the football at the LSU 29 less than two minutes into the second quarter. A 6-yard TD run by Lee Suggs capped a four-play drive.

Defensively, the Hokies kept the pressure on LSU quarterback Matt Mauck, registering four quarterback sacks and 14 hurries. Tech limited the Tigers to 80 yards on the ground and 214 yards overall. LSU converted on just one of 13 third-down plays during the contest. A pass interception by linebacker Vegas Robinson set up Tech's last touchdown.

Suggs led the Hokies with 91 yards rushing and two touchdowns on 22 carries.

A CLOSER LOOK

☛ Louisiana State, which was ranked 14th in the Associated Press poll, was the highest-ranked team in the AP poll that Virginia Tech has defeated since a 28-10 win over No. 9 Texas in the 1995 Sugar Bowl game. The last time Tech beat a higher ranked team in Blacksburg was during the 1964 season when the Hokies downed No. 10-ranked Florida State by a score of 20-11. That game was played at Miles Stadium.

☛ The attendance of 65,049 for the Tech-LSU game set new state and Tech records for the largest crowd to see a football game. The previous attendance record for the commonwealth of Virginia was 61,625 set during last season's game between Virginia Tech and Virginia in Charlottesville. The former Tech mark was set during the 2000 season when all six home games were sell-outs of 56,272.

☛ Redshirt freshman **Justin Hamilton** (Clintwood, Va.) and redshirt sophomore **Jason Lallis** (Mitchellville, Md.) both blocked punts during the Hokies' win over LSU. Hamilton's block in the second quarter set up Tech's second touchdown of the game, while Lallis' block in the fourth quarter resulted in a safety. It marked the 17th time in Frank Beamer's tenure as head coach that the special teams unit posted two blocks in a game.

☛ Only three players had rushing carries for the Hokies during the LSU game. The last time Tech only had three players carry the football in a game was during a 1994 game with Virginia.

☛ Tech's 231 yards of total offense against LSU ranks as the lowest total for the Hokies in a victory since gaining just 206 yards during a 1999 win at Pittsburgh.

Game 3

Tech Rushes To 47-21 Victory Against Thundering Herd

Sept. 12, 2002 • Lane Stadium/Worsham Field • Attendance 65,049

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Tailbacks Kevin Jones and Lee Suggs combined for 324 yards rushing and five touchdowns as No. 11 Virginia Tech posted a convincing 47-21 win against No. 16 Marshall in a Thursday night ESPN game at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

While the Tech defense was holding Marshall quarterback Byron Leftwich in check, Jones and Suggs helped the Hokies pile up a 33-0 lead before the Herd got on the scoreboard with three fourth-quarter touchdowns. Jones rushed for 171 yards and three touchdowns, while Suggs added 153 yards and a pair of TDs.

Defensively, Tech was at its best when it mattered, holding Marshall to just 234 yards during the first three quarters. The offense helped out with four touchdown drives of more than 70 yards, including a 15-play, 85-yard drive that took up more than eight minutes on the clock.

A CLOSER LOOK

☛Prior to the kickoff of the Marshall game, Tech head coach Frank Beamer's jersey was retired. Beamer, who is in his 16th season as the Hokies' head coach, was a three-year starter in the secondary for Tech from 1966-68. He is the winningest football coach in school history and is a member of the Tech Sports Hall of Fame. Beamer was the consensus Division I-A Coach of the Year in 1999 when he helped guide Tech to the national championship game.

☛Tech running backs **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) and **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) both rushed for over 150 yards in the Marshall game. Jones compiled 171 yards on 24 carries, while Suggs finished with 153 yards on 24 attempts. It marked just the second time in Tech history that two players had rushed for 150 or more yards in the same game. It was first done by tailbacks Maurice Williams (165) and Eddie Hunter (159) against William & Mary during the 1985 season. Jones and Suggs were just the third set of backs to accomplish the feat in BIG EAST history. Boston College backs Chuckie Dukes (162) and Dwight Shirley (160) did it against Michigan State in 1992. Two other BC backs, Omari Walker (185) and Mike Cloud (159), equalled the feat against Miami in 1997.

☛Tech mounted its longest touchdown drive of the season against Marshall, going 90 yards in nine plays. Tech also had a season-high 15-play drive that took 8:02 off the clock, another season-best.

☛Marshall's 442 yards passing were the most against the Hokies since 1993 when Boston College passed for 448 yards. It was the third-highest overall total ever against a Tech team. The Herd got 233 of their passing yards during the fourth quarter.

Game 4

Hokies End Texas A&M Home Streak With 13-3 Victory

Sept. 21, 2002 • Kyle Field • Attendance 83,746

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — Virginia Tech snapped Texas A&M's 29-game home winning streak against non-conference teams with a hard-fought 13-3 victory over the 19th-ranked Aggies. Tech became the first non-conference team to win at Kyle Field since Alabama in 1988.

Points and yards were hard to come by in a game that featured two of the nation's best defenses. But the Tech offense, under the direction of sophomore quarterback Bryan Randall, did what it had to do to help secure the Hokies' third straight victory over a Top 20 team. Randall guided Tech on an eight-play, 86-yard touchdown drive early in the fourth quarter that put the Hokies in control. A 52-yard pass from Randall to end Ernest Wilford was the key play, setting up a 1-yard Lee Suggs touchdown run with 12:29 left.

Tech's defense assured the victory by limiting the Aggies' offense to just 58 total yards during its last five possessions. Overall, the Hokies allowed just 156 total yards in the game. Tech forced three turnovers and sacked A&M quarterbacks five times.

Randall, in his first road start, completed 10 of 11 passes for 119 yards and did not throw an interception.

☛The crowd of 83,746 at Texas A&M's Kyle Field was the largest ever to see a Tech team play. The previous high was 80,500 fans at Clemson in 1988.

☛Tech's win at Kyle Field gave the Aggies a rare home loss. It marked just the ninth time Texas A&M has lost to any team at home since the 1988 season.

☛Tech's win against the No. 19 Aggies marked the Hokies' third win against a top 20 team in as many games. The Hokies defeated No. 14 LSU and No. 16 Marshall earlier. That marks the first time in school history Tech has beaten three teams ranked among the top 20 teams in the Associated Press Poll in successive games. The Hokies posted three wins in a row against teams in the AP Top 25 during the 1996 season, downing No. 18 Miami, No. 23 West Virginia and No. 20 Virginia in consecutive games.

☛When Texas A&M kicked a field goal in the first quarter, it marked the first points of the season against Tech in the first half of play. It also marked the first successful field goal of the season against the Hokies. Opposing teams are 1-for-2 on field goals against Tech in 2002.

☛Willie Pile's interception in the Texas A&M game was the 11th of his Tech career. The senior free safety from Alexandria, Va., is now tied for seventh on Tech's career interception list with Mike Johnson, Ashley Lee and William Yarborough.

☛Defensive end Nathaniel Adibi (Hampton, Va.) posted three sacks against Texas A&M. Adibi is the second Tech player to register three sacks in a game this season. End Jim Davis (Highland Springs, Va.) had three against LSU.

Game 5

Tech Overcomes Slow Start to Post Road Win at WMU

Sept. 28, 2002 • Waldo Field • Attendance 27,218

KALAMAZOO, Mich. — A pair of touchdowns in the final two minutes of the first half helped propel No. 5 Virginia Tech to a 30-0 victory at Western Michigan University.

The Hokies led just 3-0 before scoring twice within a 20-second span of the second quarter. A 28-yard shovel pass from quarterback Bryan Randall to tailback Lee Suggs produced Tech's first touchdown with 1:41 remaining in the half. At the 1:21 mark, linebacker Alex Markogiannakis scooped up a WMU fumble and rambled 25 yards for another Tech touchdown to give the Hokies a 16-0 lead at the end of the half.

Tech's defense produced another stellar showing, allowing just 35 yards on the ground and 268 yards overall. Tech defenders forced three fumbles, posted five quarterback sacks and compiled 21 QB hurries.

Randall directed the Hokies on scoring drives of 84 and 77 yards in the second half. He completed 13 of 19 passes for 194 yards during the game and added 40 yards rushing.

Markogiannakis picked up a WMU fumble and returned it 25 yards for his first career touchdown. It was the 47th touchdown scored by the defense under Beamer.

☛ When the Hokies and Broncos played a scoreless first quarter, it marked the first scoreless opening quarter in a Tech game since a 1999 game against West Virginia in Morgantown.

☛ Tech was the highest ranked team (No. 5) to ever play a football game at a Mid-American Conference stadium.

Tech Opens BIG EAST Play With Hard-Fought Win at BC

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. — Virginia Tech used a ball-control offense that ground out 334 yards rushing to open its BIG EAST Conference schedule with a 28-23 victory over Boston College in a Thursday night ESPN game at Alumni Stadium.

Tech put together four long touchdown drives and consumed 37:50 on the clock with an offensive attack that stuck to the ground on 61 of its 68 plays. The Hokies drove 81 and 75 yards for touchdowns in the first half on the way to a 14-7 advantage at the intermission.

Kevin Jones broke a 14-14 tie when he capped a 74-yard Tech drive late in the third quarter with a 4-yard TD run. Lee Suggs put the finishing touches on another 75-yard drive and the win with a 27-yard scoring run with 5:41 left. Quarterback Bryan Randall joined his tailbacks in making key plays as Tech finished with 420 yards of total offense. Randall tossed a 44-yard TD pass to Ernest Wilford and made several key scrambles for first downs.

Tech's defense contributed four sacks, three interceptions and a fumble recovery while holding BC to 83 yards on the ground and 315 yards overall. The Hokies also benefited from a pair of costly personal foul penalties by the Eagles.

☛Both **Lee Suggs** (Roanoke, Va.) and **Kevin Jones** (Chester, Pa.) rushed for over 100 yards in the Boston College game. Suggs ran for 154 yards on 26 carries, while Jones posted 144 yards on 18 attempts. That marks the second time this season that Suggs and Jones have both produced over 100-yards on the ground in the same game. The last time Tech had the same two players both rush for 100 yards or more in the same game twice in a season was 1986. That year, tailbacks Maurice Williams and Eddie Hunter accomplished the feat three times, both rushing for over 100 yards in games against Syracuse, Virginia and Richmond. During their Tech careers, Williams and Hunter both gained over 100 yards on the ground in the same game a record four times. They also stand as the only Tech players ever to rush for 100 or more yards in the same bowl game (1986 Peach Bowl). The only other Tech twosome since 1950 to accomplish the feat more than once in the same season was Phil Rogers and James Barber in 1973. Rogers and Barber both ran for over 100 yards in games against Virginia and Florida State.

☛Virginia Tech's 15 penalties against Boston College were the most during Frank Beamer's 15-plus seasons as head coach. The previous high was 14 against South Carolina in 1988 and Miami in 1993.

☛**Willie Pile** (Alexandria, Va.) posted his second interception of the season and the 12th of his career during the Hokies' win at Boston College. His pick against the Eagles moves him into a tie for fifth place on both the Tech and BIG EAST career lists for interceptions. Pile is tied with John Granby and Mike Widger on the Tech list. He shares the fifth spot on the BIG EAST list with former Syracuse player, Donovin Darius.

Hokies Celebrate Homecoming With 35-14 Win Over RU

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Virginia Tech scored 21 unanswered points in the first quarter to pave the way for a 35-14 Homecoming victory against Rutgers.

Once again, the running of tailbacks Lee Suggs and Kevin Jones highlighted the day for the Hokies, who finished with 342 yards on the ground and 492 yards overall. Suggs led the way with 197 yards and a pair of touchdown runs, while Jones added 132 yards, including a highlight-reel, 58-yard TD scamper. Quarterback Bryan Randall was efficient through the air, completing 11 of 15 passes for 131 yards and a touchdown.

Tech's defense kept the pressure on the Scarlet Knights, registering eight quarterback sacks and two interceptions, while limiting the visitors to minus-seven yards rushing. Rutgers still managed to stay within striking distance until DeAngelo Hall weaved his way 51 yards for a touchdown on a punt return with just under five minutes remaining in the game.

Tech Overcomes Turnovers To Hand Temple 20-10 Loss

BLACKSBURG, Va. — Despite a sub-par offensive performance that included four turnovers, Virginia Tech remained undefeated with a 20-10 BIG EAST victory against Temple at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

The Hokies drove for a touchdown on their first possession of the game, but had trouble maintaining consistency on offense during the remainder of the contest. Tech had possessions ended by fumbles twice and tossed a pair of interceptions. Two of those turnovers came on the Tech side of the field, while one of the interceptions was returned to the Hokies' 26-yard line. A 32-yard touchdown catch by fullback Doug Easlick on the final play of the third quarter and two Nic Schmitt field goals proved just enough of an edge for Tech.

Once again, the Hokies' defense helped save the day, limiting the Owls to just 39 yards on the ground and intercepting three passes. Redshirt sophomore Vincent Fuller picked off passes at the Tech 8-yard line and in the end zone to stop a pair of Temple scoring threats. The Owls converted on just 3 of 12 third-down conversions against the Hokies and finished with 269 total yards.

Pittsburgh Rallies To Hand Hokies First Loss Of Season

Nov. 2, 2002 • Lane Stadium/Worsham Field • Attendance 64,971

BLACKSBURG, Va. — The University of Pittsburgh scored 21 unanswered points in the second half to knock No. 3 Virginia Tech from the ranks of the unbeaten with a 28-21 win at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. It was the Panthers' first-ever win in Blacksburg.

Pittsburgh engineered the win by controlling the line of scrimmage on both sides of the ball. The Panthers rolled up 483 yards of offense in the game, including 301 yards in the second half. Their total included 275 yards on the ground against a Tech defense that entered the game ranked No. 1 nationally in rushing defense with an average of 40.8 yards allowed per game.

Tech enjoyed a 14-0 lead early in the first quarter and led 21-7 after a 59-yard touchdown run by tailback Lee Suggs less than two minutes into the second half. The Panthers turned the game around with a pair of quick TD passes in the third quarter and took the lead on a 53-yard touchdown run by Brandon Miree with just over four minutes remaining in the game.

The Tech offense mounted just one threat after Suggs' third-quarter touchdown run, moving to the Pittsburgh 25 before missing a field goal attempt.

☛ Virginia Tech's 28-21 loss to Pittsburgh marked just the seventh BIG EAST loss for Tech at home since the football league formed in 1991. The Hokies are now 0-3 against the Panthers in the month of November and 7-0 in September and October.
